Took another look at "The Virginia Graham Show" last week (4 p.m. Channel 8, Monday through Friday) and the second look merely confirmed what I suppose I already knew from watching her old show, "Girl Talk."

Virginia Graham, as a talk show hostess, is a vulgar, mouthy individual who is either obsessed with sex for sex's sake or because she knows that in show business it can be equated with money. Whatever the reason she comes on like a not very bright adolescent who has just discovered the shock value of the subject.

She is a boor who is boring, no mean feat even in The Wasteland.

On the portion of the show I watched she entertained guest Mel Ferrer, Lois Nettleton and Louis Nye, all show biz celebrities and an author who had made a study of divorce in men by researching the habits of apes. Fascinating, yes? Fascinating, No!

These particular guests also served to remind us that most actors and actresses should never be allowed on talk shows where they must assume their own personalities.

Lois Nettleton, a credible actress and a very attractive woman physically, opened her mouth and destroyed the charm she projects when she is dealing in someone else's words and moods.

Mel Ferrer, now director and producer, who spoke very quietly indeed, made the two women appear by contrast to be as raucous as a couple of crows.

Louis Nye's inanities when not controlled or channeled by a show host tend to be a great deal less amusing than when there is some kind of order to his madness.

The kids came in before the show was over and I gratefully relinquished the set to the remainder of "Sesame Street."

CROMWELL—Family—History and derring-do about old England's political wars, Alpe Guinness and Richard Harris.

DERBY—Adults—A story of roller-derbies and the people who share them; their moralities, aspirations and thrills.

FIVE EASY PIECES—Adults, with reservations—Excellent acting and pace in haunting story of a man running away from his roots and responsibilities.

GINGER—Condemned.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Leenhouts of Belvista Drive, Penfield, will celebrate their golden wedding anniversary on June 4th.

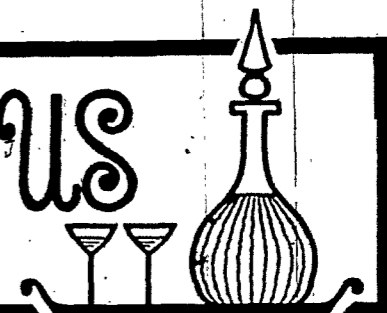
