State Approves \$1.7 Million For Diocesan Schools

Schools in the Diocese of Rochester will receive approximately \$1.7 million of state funds during 1972 to finance teaching of non-religious subjects under terms of new legislation entitled "Secular Educational Services Bill," passed last Saturday by the State Legislature.

The new money, added to Mandated Services funds of \$1.3 million paid to grammar and high schools of the diocese annually, will bring state aid to the Rochester Diocese, computed on a per pupil basis, to approximately \$3,175,000 in 1972, according to Father Daniel Brent, Superintendent of Schools.

The bill won by more than 100 votes in the Assembly (107-40) and by a 4-1 margin in the Senate (44-11).

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Bishop Attacks National 'Curse of Pornography'

The following are major excerpts from Bishop Joseph L. Hogan's address on "Pornography" on May 29 over WSAW, Rochester, and affiliate stations, the Family Rosary network.

There is a dreadful blight upon our nation today, my dear people, which should be a matter of concern to all of us who love our country. Those who have made it their life-work to study the rise and fall of civilizations assure us that, if left unchecked, it will surely spell our death as a nation.

It is a moral cancer eroding the vitality and spirit of America — an environmental pollution poisoning the minds and hearts of many Americans, especially our youth who are

meant to be the promise and hope of our future. As your spiritual leader, I speak tonight with a sense of urgency about the curse of pornography.

What is so tragic is that men selected by our government to examine the disease have themselves been caught in the trend of accepting its existence, without shock or surprise or a sense of shame in the decline of moral values. The majority of the members of the Commission have expressed their belief that they find no great threat to our national life if smut and obscenity continue unchecked; that no scientific evidence proves that words and pictures have any influence on human conduct; that they do not offend against prevailing community standards; that they are
