## Scholastic Notebook

The last barrier to publicparochial high school athletic competition may be coming

Father Daniel Brent, super-intendent of the Catholic schools of the Rochester Dio-cese, formally made a pitch to the local Section 5 group of the New York State Public High School Athletic Association to permit Rochester Catholic high schools to participate in future Section 5 athletic tournaments on an experimen-

Section 5 President Oliver Cook said a sub-committee was formed to discuss mutual problems of both the public and parochial school groups and that if they came up with a so-lution it would be presented to Section 5's executive committee for forwarding to the central committee of the NYSPHSAA in Albany for a decision.

If the experiment worked out, it may well permit Catholic high schools to participate in public school tournaments throughout the state Cook said.

Last year the Diocesan Bas-ketball Tournament produced a first time champion in De-Sales of Geneva but other than that drummed up little excitement what with the four Rochester Catholic high schools competing against each other all season anyway.

Including Catholic teams in these tournaments would also eliminate the need for guess-work on the part of enthusias tic sportswriters trying to de-termine who is No. 1, (In football there are no tournaments in New York State. However the state has given permission for high schools to play in nine games this fall. To our knowledge no Rochester area high school football team has announced a ninth game. Rush-Henrietta and Aquinas — you out there?)

Father Brent said he was very pleased with the openness and willingness of the public school people to discuss the problems.

He said he was impressed with the Section's friendliness, honesty and their willingness to look closer at the problem.

"I see nothing but good coming out of our talks," Father

This marked the first time that a Catholic school administrator had appeared before the public school group. In the past Catholic school coaches or ath-letic directors made similar appeals which always fell upon

"When the highest ranking Catholic school's administrator asks," Cook said, "there'll be some action." Apparently so.

"Everything was amicable at our meeting," Cook added. "Just getting it discussed is a step in the right direction. Now it's just a question of time."

The sub-committee's findings could reach the NYSPHSAA in time for their August meeting, Cook said. The central committee must rule on any matter or matters not already on the NYSPHSAA books.

The biggest obstacle probably will be the question of school boundaries—the public schools have them (although it's somewhat loose in the City School District of Rochester) and the Catholic schools don't. The public schools have complained bitterly over the years that lack of boundaries gives the Catholic schools a much greater area to "select," "draw," or "recruit" athletes from

Two years ago after making Courier-Journal



a request to join the Central Western Conference in football and the Monroe County League in other sports, the four Rochester Catholic schools merged with the City School District in all sports but track and football. Last year track was added and this fall Catholic schools meet city public schools for the first time in football.

The special sub-committee trying to solve the problems between the public and parochial systems includes Lewis Obourn of East Rochester, NYSPHSAA central committee member; Nick Zona, Rochester City School District health and physical education chief; Carl Palumbo, Yictor Central principal and vice president of Section 5: and Father Brent.


Aguinas will defend its state championship title in July in conjunction with the American Legion's convention competi-tions in Rochester.
