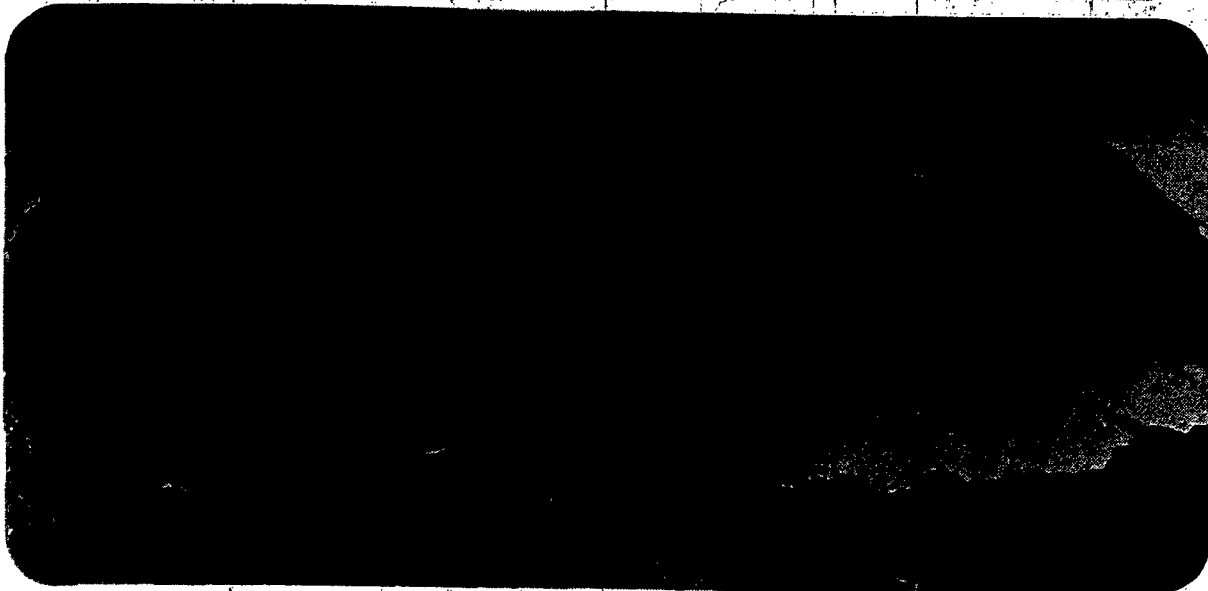

10-Mile Hike Nets \$3,000

Wayland—The June 6 Tramp For Trees netted \$3,000 in pledges for new trees for the village and for Project REACH at Perkinsville and Project HOPE.

The committee has announced that \$300 per mile was pledged to the nearly 250 participants in the 10-mile hike. Money collected should be turned in at the business office at Wayland Central School or to St. Joseph School or rectory. Tentative deadline is June 25.

Father James Marvin, St. Joseph's pastor, who heads the committee, completed the 10 miles himself with \$28.50 in

pledges riding on each mile he tramped. He said he was "personally happy about the Tramp, particularly since it marked a real achievement of community spirit."

"Due to the efforts of the young people of Wayland who are responsible for the grass-roots organization, the Tramp was a very great success," he said.
