There is far more involved in the Rushville Clinic than a building and an effort to meet the critical medical-dental needs of disadvantaged people. The whole spirit envisioned by the Secular Mission in the Houses of Concern in Penn Yan, Seneca Falls and Lyons came to fruition at Rushville. It was a spirit of cooperation, concern and willingness to live the Christian message on the part of people of various denominational affiliations.

The House of Concern in Penn Yan has been trying for more than three years, to meet the needs of poor people. Currently, it is under the direction of Church Women United. Incidentally, this storefront has been most helpful financially to the Rushville Clinic.

The House of Concern in Seneca County has moved from its original location between Seneca Falls and Waterloo, to an abandoned church in Seneca Falls; truly a credit to the ecumenical spirit.
