Parish Councils Are Growing in Diocese

Fifty-seven parishes have active parish councils and another 54 have none at all, Msgr. Donald J. Mulcaby, reported to the diocesan Priests' Senate re-cently in the first progress statement on steps leading to establishment of the Diocesan Pastoral Council.

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The remainder of the 160 parishes in the diocese acknowledged being in the planning stage, he said, or have made no report of their status to Auxil-iary Bishop John E. McCafferty, who ordered the May survey as director of planning for the dio-cesan council, Msgr, Mulcahy is executive secretary of the planning program.

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the pastoral council by putting Bishop McCafferty and Msgr. Mulcahy in charge on March 29.

Shortly before that the Priests' Senate had strongly urged the Bishop to undertake formation of the pastoral body by regionalizing the diocese, mandating parish councils and establishing an education and formation committee to work out the shape and scope of the council-to-be.

Msgr. Mulcahy told the senators that a formation committee had begun its meetings. Following the suggestion of the Senate, he said, its initial goals are to help each parish establish or strengthen its own council. It will also encourage cooperation between parish councils and various parish committees presently existing within the same regions.

Clyde Credit Union Gets Development Grant

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presented to the Clyde Federal Credit Union on Tuesday, June 22, by Father John Hempel for the Human Development Cam-paign Fund and by Father George Wyant for the Secular Mission.

The credit union, Father Hempel said, serves the needs of people, such as those on welfare, who cannot borrow from a bank because they are credit "risks."

"Besides filling this need," said Father Hempel, "the credit union also teaches its 233 members how to handle money and gives them more buying power."

Grants totaling \$1,700 were Most loans made by the Clyde union are small, limited loans to fill immediate needs of the borrower.

> Grant of the money followed approval by the Wayne County Human Development Task Force of the credit union's proposal for funding. Of the total supplied, \$1,200 came from the Human Development Campaign Fund; the Secular Mission gave the other \$500.

> The credit union in Clyde grew out of the Neighborhood Community Center set up there by the Wayne County Community Action Program, sponsored in turn by the Wayne Board of Supervisors. Although it is part of a federally-initiated program, the Clyde credit union operates on local funds.

Half of the money, according to Father Hempel, goes immediately to the credit union; the remainder will be held in es-crow until January 1972, pend-ing a progress report this Dec-
