Parish liturgical committees will learn the practical steps of improving parochial worship at a summer institute titled "People at Worship," arranged by the diocesan Liturgical Commission at Notre Dame Retreat

House on July 16-17.

Discussions will be led by Father Joseph Cunningham, vice president of the National Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions. Three conferences will cover the role of the parish committee in implementing the liturgical directives of Vatican II and creating a living community in the parish.

# No Summertime Doldrums At Charles Settlement House

The Charles Settlement House offers an alternative to the "nothing-to-do" summertime blues.

From July 6 through August 13, boys and girls ages 6 through 12 can take part in a summer program of crafts and games, sports, swimming, trips to parks and cultural activities.

There will be three separate programs for the children at the following sites: Charles Settlement House, 445 Jay St., between Lyell Avenue and Main

Street West, and from State Street west to the city line; St. Peter and Paul, 720 Main St. W., is the Day Camp site for the children in the Brown Street, Silver Street, King Street, Madison Street and Jefferson Avenue area; and the children of the Jay Street, Ames Street and Hague Street area can take part in the program at Holy Family Church, 415 Ames St.

An advance day camp is being offered from July 6 through Aug. 13 for 13 to 15-year-old

boys. Day, evening and overnight camping are scheduled; plus educational activities and services to the neighborhood. The highlight is a week of camping in the Adirondacks.

From June 28 until Aug. 27 the Charles House has set aside the hours 1 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m., Mondays through Fridays, as a Teen Drop-In time. There will be no scheduled events, the facilities available at the house will be open for use during these hours.



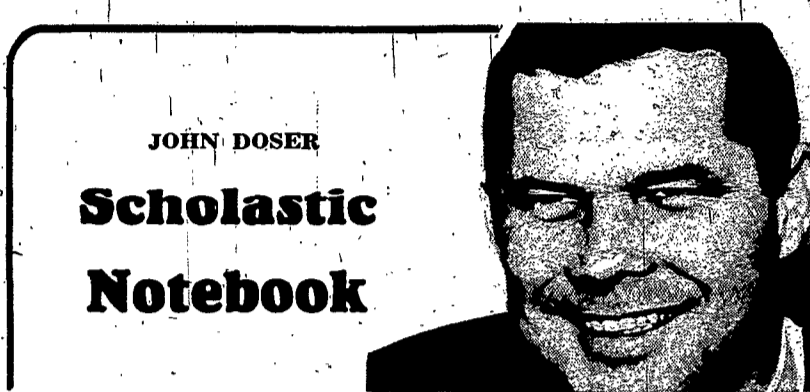

## De Clerck to Teach Scuba at CYO

James De Clerck of Spencerport has plumbed the depths of the Caribbean and the Adriatic Sea. What can the CYO pool offer him? A chance to pass on his skin and scuba diving skills. On four consecutive Saturdays, starting July 17, De Clerck will instruct a co-ed class in diving and the physics and physiology involved. During day-long sessions, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., the students will spend four hours in the pool and four hours in the lecture room. Underwater photography, night diving and ice diving are among the topics to be covered.

De Clerck, a staff assistant to Kodak's foreign traffic manager, attended the YMCA Scuba Instructors' Institute and has taught for six years. He has done photography and light salvage work under the waters of the Finger Lakes and area quarries.

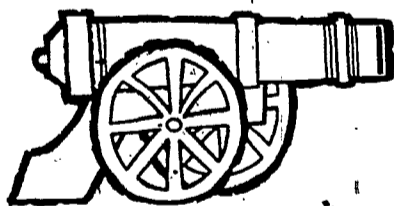
