## Diocese Donates Henrietta Land To Housing Group

Housing in suburbia for approximately 150 low and moderate-income families may soon develop from the gift of diocesan-owned land in Henrietta to the I-C Housing Development Fund Co. Inc. of Rochester.

The diocesan decision to offer the land free of charge to encourage the corporation in its efforts to house lower income families was recommended by the Diocesan Priests' Council at its June meeting.

The diocese has offered the non-profit corporation, controlled by the Catholic Interracial Council, a portion of a 16-acre property on Stone Road near Pinnacle Road in Henrietta, south of the city. The diocese purchased the site six years ago for a future parish complex.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan and Father James Moynihan, chancellor, and pastors in the Henrietta-Pittsford area have held discussions with the officers of the I-C corporation about the desirability of the site and the prospects of the housing complex.
