Recently, our office took a stand whereby we refused to support "Housing Week" held in Rochester. No doubt our position was looked upon as being against low and moderate income housing — supposedly the week was designed to meet the housing crisis. On the contrary our office has constantly and consistently struggled to bring about decent housing for all, especially the disadvantaged.

The rationale for our opposition was grounded in initial discussions about planning for the week itself. The direction was geared only as an informational vehicle with no real provisions to fulfill its aspirations.

The elements of "Housing Week" did not appear to have the necessary ingredients to move the political structure to take seriously the need for low and moderate income housing in the towns and suburbs. To develop a community isolated from the reality of all kinds of people, is to produce a world constantly teetering on the brink of conflict and confrontation; a world in which all people will never really know or understand each other.

Our office has been a strong supporter of the Metropolitan Housing Council. This is an effort to bring all the housing agencies under one umbrella so as to bring about the housing so desperately n e e d e d. We would like to congratulate John Mitchell in his efforts to make the council a reality. But in all that happened during "Housing Week" probably the most meaningful was the financial support of \$100,000 to the Housing Council given by the four Downtown Churches. Here was something tangible that will make the Metropolitan Housing Council a reality. If only the county political structure had given at least its psychological support to the council, the kinds

Irish Priest Relates Native Land Crisis

Father Oliver Stokes, OP, commenting on the situation in Northern Ireland to the First Friday Luncheon Club said, "England waited until the lid blew off the top and now it's in the hands of fanatics."

"The British want a peaceful Ulster," Father Stokes continued. "If the British Parliament had made a complete takeover instead of the North Irish government when the trouble broke out you would have seen an end to discrimination in employment because of religion."

Father Stokes said that "many Irish feel the country should never have been divided, but it has been divided and two separate mentalities do exist. So, the formation of a Federation is a possible solution."

Father is in Rochester for a year as assistant pastor to Msgr. Leslie Whalen at Our Lady of Lourdes Church. He has done mission work in Trinidad and has taught in Southern Ireland.

Father Stokes pointed out that television coverage exaggerates the riot type situations in Ulster county. "When we see American campus riots," he explained, "we think the whole city is rioting, so you must realize that the situation in Northern Ireland is equally exaggerated; it is safe to pass through northern cities," he concluded.
