Father James Hushek, a member of the Carmelites, said shortly after the event ended, "It looks like we'll be able to make our first full yearly payment for the first time in three

Several individuals close to the project said they expected Fun-D Days to become an annual event at the monastery.

A check among the Fun-D Days sponsors revealed that they were overwhelmed by the number of people who turned

out for the fund drive. One individual said, "We expected a couple of thousand people, but nothing like this.

"We were prepared to serve a maximum of 300 spaghetti dinners on the two days. Boy, were we off in our figuring. We ended up serving more than 1,-200 spaghetti meals."

Father Hushel said he felt some money would be received from the Fun-D Days operation, but he never expected to re-ceive as much money as the drive turned in.

"We did twice as much as we anticipated," Father Hushek reported.


