Pope Paul VI acknowledges the cheers of the crowd after giving them his Sunday blessing from the terrace of his Summer home in Castelgandolfo, Italy. After the blessing, the pontiff — speaking in Serbian, Croatia and Slovene — broadcast special greetings to thousands of Catholics gathered in Yugoslavia at the end of two Marian congresses. The stake: if the priest won, Triceno would have to return to the practice of Sunday Mass.

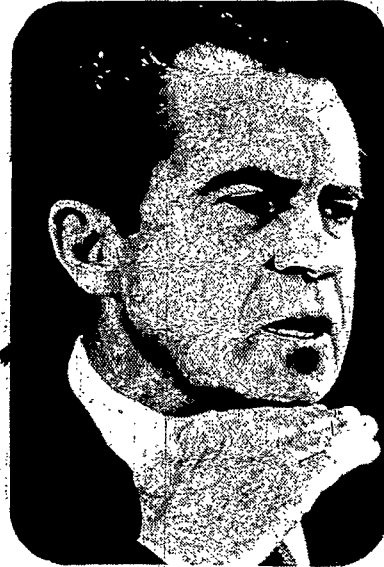
To the cheers and jeers of partisan Catholics and Commu-

President, Cardinal In Strong Pleas for Private School Aid

New York—President Nixon and Cardinal Terence Cooke fired a double-barreled salvo in favor of government aid to nonpublic schools at the annual meeting of the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus here.

In his address, Cardinal Cooke, cited such aid as the right of Catholic citizens.

"We call upon fellow Americans for justice," he said. "We call upon them not only for our Constitutional rights but also for the governmental support which will enable our parents to exercise those rights."

The New York prelate spoke of a paradox concerning parochial schools. Noting the constitutional guarantee that parents have a right to provide for the education of their children,
