# Retired as a Teacher, Sister Works at Hospital

Auburn --- "My role as caseworker in the Social Service Department here at Mercy Hospital is but another way to continue my commitment to giving self to God and others," reflects Sister Francis deSales, retired teacher, as she looks back over her past year's experience at Mercy Hospital.

A nun for 48 years, Sister Francis de Sales of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph, taught in the elementary school system in the Rochester Diocese for 46 years. The past 12 years were at St. Mary's school in Auburn,

Retiring from teaching, she finds her new undertaking not only fulfilling but says it reflects a growing attitude that those in religious communities can redirect their experiences, training, and commitment after retiring from one field of work.

As sister-caseworker, she assists the hospital in providing spiritual care in a comprehensive or total patient care program which includes a patient's physical, emotional, and spiritual needs.

By performing routine procedures, Sister enables the director of social services to persue more intensive casework. She greets all admissions and through day-to-day contact with patients fulfills the crucial role of casefinding.

Sister serves patients and families as needed, either offering direct service or by referring them to other community agencies. She assists the chaplain in carrying out his duties, makes referrals to clergymen of the patient's choice, and performs services contributing to the comfort and well being of the patient.

Sister feels her presence as a nun symbolizes the thoughtfulness and spiritual consideration of Christ and in itself may be reassuring to patients. She furthers the spiritual tone in the lives of the patients which may become even more important as Mercy Hospital expands its proto include chronic care and/rehabilitation programs.

Describing her work, she comments, "People ask me what I do. The description is a clinical one, but not the work I do. The answer is as varied as the people whom I serve. The simplest, but best reply is that I try to respond to the needs of the sick and suffering. Because I am a nun, I bring an added dimension to the lives of patients."

It is unusual for the sister of one congregation to be employed by another community. Sister Francis de Sales, a St. Joseph Sister, made arrangements with Sister Joan Alice, administrator of Mercy Hospi-tal, Order of St. Francis, to take on this work.
