Penn Yan Schools Open

Penn Yan — The days get shorter, footballs begin to supplant baseballs, and stores everywhere feature "back to school" specials. School doors will soon swing wide to welcome students back.

St. Michael's School in Penn Yan will open on Sept. 7 with an anticipated total enrollment of 105 students in kindergarten through sixth grade. The addition of a kindergarten and the St. Michael's Home and School Association are the principal changes the school will see this fall.

A newly equipped and painted classroom awaits the 17 young children in the kindergarten and their teacher, Mrs. Anthony Pizzenti. Materials necessary to prepare the room were provided from the proceeds of a pot luck supper and a kindergarten shower in June.

The inaugural meeting of the Home and School Association will take place on Sept. 15. The association replaced the existing Mothers' Club in June after parents voted for it to get fathers more actively involved in school programs.

The Association will continue the fund-raising activities of the Mothers' Club, such as the "next to new" sale in October. The Sept. 15 meeting will be opened with a Mass celebrated by Father Kevin Murphy. The Mass will be followed by a talk on the religious education program in the school.

DiTroia, a senior, will be seeking his third varsity letter this fall. He was an offensive halfback as a sophomore, and a defensive back last year. This season, DiTroia will also be tried at defensive tackle. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur DiTroia, 48 Fleming St., Rochester.


Whitney, also a senior, will be trying for his third varsity

letter. The 6-foot-3, 225-pounder started at defensive guard in his sophomore year, and made 46 tackles. Last season he worked every game at offensive tackle. Whitney is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald C. Whitney, 102 Wheelton Drive, Rochester.

Both DiTroia and Whitney are majoring in Physical Education at Ithaca College.
