### Fr. Bede Scully

Father Bede Scully, OFM, Cap., 64, died at the General Hospital, Sharon, Conn., after a brief illness, on Aug. 18. For the last 16 years he had served as Catholic chaplain at the State School for the mentally retarded at Wassau, N.Y.

Father Scully was born in Yonkers on July 21, 1907.

He was a chaplain with the Navy from 1943 until 1946. In 1951, he became the first superior of the Capuchin's new foundation, St. Fidelis, Friary, Interlaken, N.Y. In 1955 he began his work as Catholic chaplain at Wassau State School for the mentally retarded.

By 10 a.m. on a Monday morning the tables were set up in the garage bearing all of the aforementioned plus pocket-books, supermarket art, a dead butterfly, picture books, comic books.

A huge sign outside the garage proclaimed the event. Printed invitations had been issued the preceding Friday.

I'm not sure but I think it may have been an unqualified success. Although the number of traders was small, enthusiasm seemed to be unlimited.
