



Pakistani Refugees Rest

Calcutta — (RNS) — East Pakistani refugee families are sleeping on straw mattresses at the Salt Lake Refugee Camp on the outskirts of Calcutta.

The cost of providing for the estimated 8 million persons who have fled from their homes is tremendous. Already the Indian government has spent more than the sum budgeted for new economic development in all India for the year. Yet, to the individual

refugee, it bring only enough food and clothing to exist.

Voluntary agencies, national and international, and church groups are also giving supplementary assistance and are operating relief programs to feed, clothe, shelter and give medical attention to the refugees. But, according to a recent report from Caritas India, "by and large the plight of the refugees continues to be miserable."
