"Hoa-Binh" is the Vietnamese word for "Peace." It is also the title of one of the most moving of moving pictures that has come along in a long time. It is the creation largely of Raoul Coutard, probably the finest cinematographer in the world.

Coutard was the cinematographer for such memorable films as David Hart's "Scrubbs," Tony Richardson's "Sailor from Gibraltar," and Costa-Gavras's "Z" and "The Confession." As for "Hoa-Binh," he wrote the screen play, cast the players, directed them, and lent the vehicle the magic of his lenses and lighting.

The plot is paper thin, but fathoms deep. A Vietnamese village family is broken when the father goes off to fight with the Viet Cong. The mother develops cancer and is taken to a Saigon hospital, where she dies. The children, a ten-year-old boy and a two-year-old daughter, are placed with wretched cousins, who eventually drive them away. The boy picks up the little girl and sets out for Saigon against the bloody backdrop of the war.

(If the little girl, Xuan, doesn't make you weep, you should pay a visit to your shrink.)

Coutard's mastery over the raw material from which he shaped "Hoa-Binh" is self-evident. He first went to Vietnam in 1945 with French occupation forces as a photographer for the French Military Information Service. Mustered out after five and a half years, he remained in Vietnam as a stringer for Paris Match and Life and other magazines and news-reels. He covered the fall of Dienbienphu, which marked the end of French colonialism in Indochina, married a Vietnamese girl from Hue. They have two children, Claude, 11, and Sylvie, 9, and his base is his home town of Fresnes, outside Paris.

At the end of "Hoa-Binh" the father finds his children on the streets of Saigon and the boy wonders what "Hoa-Binh," or Peace, would be like. He has never known it. The father does not have a ready reply but Coutard had some thoughts about it over luncheon the other day.

"There would be peace in Vietnam if the North took over the South after the Americans leave," the strong-jawed Frenchman said through his interpreter, Yvette Nallet. "But it would not be a peace that would lead to, let's say, the building of Hilton Hotels along the beautiful beaches. The North would not want tourists to see the kind of peace they were imposing on the South."

"There would be peace, too, if the South used all that equipment the Americans will give them and took over in the North. That's most unlikely, of course. But it is possible. The trouble with that particular peace would be that it wouldn't last very long."

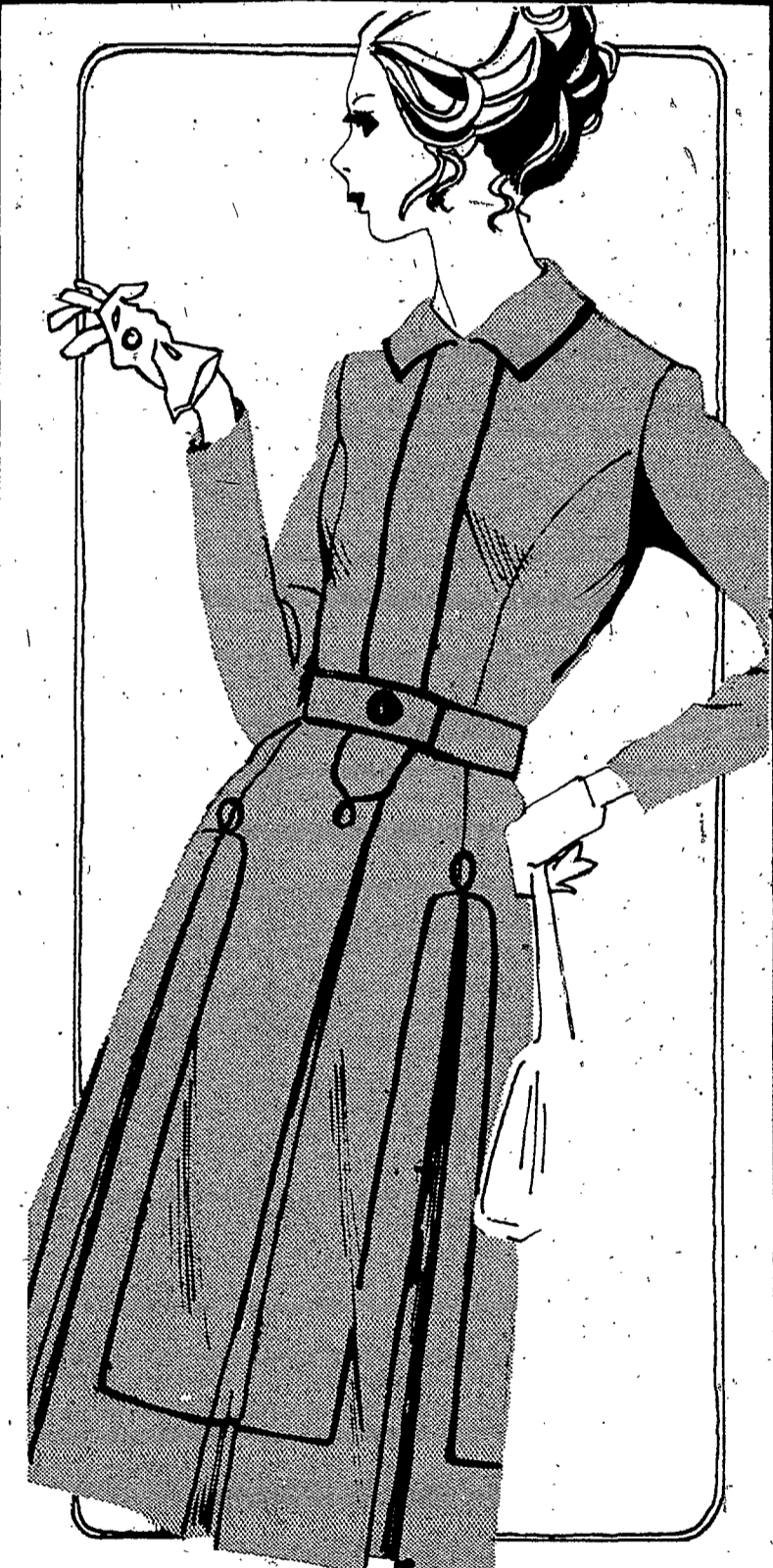
