Bishop McCafferty Says Red Mass

At the annual Red Mass Sept. 12, celebrated at St. Joseph's Church in Rochester, Auxiliary Bishop John E. McCafferty told members of the legal professions that prisons are "behind the times."

Moved to depart from his prepared text by the revolt of inmates at Attica prison, Bishop McCafferty said events there should "bring to the forefront of our own concerns" the cause of penal reform.

Bishop McCafferty told those attending the Mass that because crime exists, "measures must be taken,' and pointed out that the failure of social restraints means that "unfortunates will deviate."

"At the same time." he said.
"We desire not the death of
the sinner but the death of sin."

Citing the Gospel account of Joseph of Arimathea Bishop McCafferty said, "do not let the hour for action pass."
