

Graymoor Friars Plan Ecumenical Community

Garrison, N.Y. — (RNS) — The Graymoor Ecumenical Institute, an agency of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement, plans to sponsor an ecumenical religious community.

Though the Institute will advertise the project and give initial guidance, it is leaving decisions about the actual life of the new community to those who join it. The unit, according to an announcement, would consist of "Protestants and Anglicans as well as Catholics."

Father Ralph Thomas, director of the Institute, and Brother Alexander Keliher will give general direction to the new community in its formative period, but will not join it.

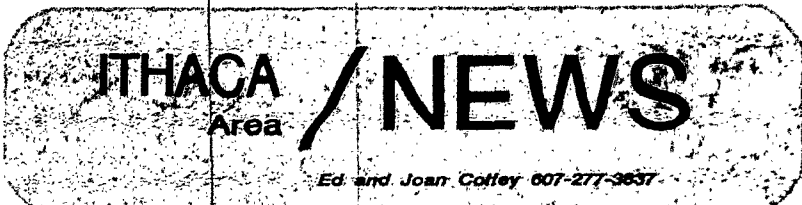
The primary purpose of the

move, they say, is to advance the ecumenical movement — the apostolate of the Society of the Atonement.

The community will have no ecclesiastical status, since canon law does not allow for the acceptance of non-Catholics into a Catholic religious order.

New Attitudes Explained By Religious Educator

Ithaca — A special inter-parochial conference was held Sept. 19 at Immaculate Conception to introduce the religious education programs for all ages to be conducted in the Ithaca parishes.

Guest speaker was Father Holland, diocesan director of religious education. Also taking part were Fathers David Gramkee and David Mura of Immaculate Conception parish, Mike Stanley, religious education director at St. Catherine of Siena parish, and Sisters Nancy and Kathleen of the Immaculate Conception school. Parents and others attending were able to examine textbooks that will be used this year.

Father Holland explained the contrasting philosophies behind the "old" religious education program and the "new." He pointed out that interpretation of Revelation (how God speaks to us) is the key to understanding the differences between the old and new programs.

During the past twenty years both secular and religious life have changed significantly, Father Holland continued. The static life is gone. We are a nation on wheels. TV has broadened our world. The impact of change has been felt in the Church. Since Vatican II, there has been a new interpretation of Revelation: although Revelation reached a highpoint in Jesus Christ, God continues to talk to us today. The religious

education programs of the present must help young people "tune in" to God.

It is more important for the educator to create an attitude in those he teaches than merely to dispense facts, Father Holland went on. Because the young have grown up on TV, film strips, movies, and posters speak their language and are useful tools.

Perhaps the most difficult aspect of the new religious education programs for the adults, he suggested, is the realization of the risks of freedom — no one knows what God will say, nor what our answer will be. Today the secular and religious are not separated: everything one does is religious, he said.

Father Mura gave a general account of the new interdenominational religious education program for all area high school students that is about to open at the "Tin Can" in Stewart Park.

Father Gramkee talked of the numerous adult education programs available. In addition to parental meetings prior to Baptisms and First Communions, Immaculate Conception Parish offers a pre-marriage series. Also, the parish will offer a new adult education program on Tuesday evenings, commencing Oct. 5. A course on Sacred Scripture will be taught by Father Mura and one on Christian morality will be conducted by Father Gramkee.
