SARAH CHILD All In The Family

The short essay our church bulletin carries each week on its front and back covers encompasses a variety of subjects and I always read the offering with interest.

But it was with particular interest that I delved into last week's few paragraphs titled "Fathers and Daughters."

Her father is the man who first gives the daughter a sense of her own worth as a woman the essay began.

"Day by day, in the intimacy of family life, by observing her father and mother, the little girl absorbs her impressions of the relationship between man and woman, between husband and wife. The self-esteem which the little girl forms of herself as a woman will depend in large degree upon the courtesy and esteem which her father shows toward her mother."

The article continues by pointing out that the husband who leaves clothes lying about and does not clean up after himself is saying about his wife, "She isn't very important; she's just a servant; she's there to wait on me."

From this object lesson the daughter concludes that such a situation must be accepted as part of her heritage.

The essay was fascinating to me on several counts. First is the inherent truth in it. What a child sees as commonplace in the home, a child accepts as the norm.

Second, the essay appeared at times so personally opportune as to be a little scary. Only the day before I had been discussing with a friend what I considered an unfair arrangement in her house and the cause of some personal troubles with which she had been regaling me. She had both daughters and sons, yet only the daughters were expected to help with the housework. One son

had no duties whatsoever, to the detriment of an amiable household. She had gone to an earlier Mass this particular Sunday and stopped on her way home to wave the bulletin at me. But by far the most interesting factor relating to the essay was where I found it, in a Catholic publication!

Women's lib has taken the Catholic Church to task for what it terms its spirit of male chauvinism. The charge is not without foundation. Yet, if an article of this essence appears for all to read, surely someone somewhere is taking note.

Likewise about six months ago from our own pulpit, an assistant pastor (a maverick to be sure) astonished us with a list of the rights of women ranging from the privilege of wearing pants to church to the possibility of ascending to the priesthood.

Clearly, there are changes coming with the Church reflecting the switch in general social patterns. For many of us it is a welcome sign.
