City League football teams won't be taking an awful lot of lumps before they start beating Catholic League teams.

Consider: East scored first against Aquinas, were tied 6-6 against the Irish at halftime before losing 20-8; Jefferson shut out McQuaid, 6-0; Franklin did everything better except score enough points and lost to Mooney, 12-8; and Kearney whopped Edison (so is everyone else) 40-0.

The second round of City-Catholic League games comes up this Saturday with these scraps: Aquinas-Edison, 1 p.m., at Franklin; McQuaid at East, 1 p.m.; Mooney at Marshall, 1 p.m.; Madison vs. Kearney, 1:30 p.m., at Aquinas Stadium.

We caught half of the Mooney-Franklin tussle and half of the Aquinas-East contest, and talked with Mooney athletic director Ed Nietopski, city school district health and phys ed chief Nick Zona, East athletic director Don Murray, and Madison coach Don Lander.

Nietopski was disappointed with the crowd at Aquinas Stadium. Franklin had less than 35 people in their half of the stadium and Mooney's was far smaller than usual.

While coach Tony Merola's troops were toiling en route to their big win over the Quakers, back home on Maiden Lane four classes of Mooney students were competing in a paper drive for some noble purpose — all day long.

"They could have had the paper drive the following Saturday," Nietopski said, because the Cards play on Sunday then and there wouldn't have been any conflict.

Zona stopped in at East to check things out and planned on going down to Charlotte to catch McQuaid-Jeff.

While Aquinas had a larger crowd than the home-team Orientals at Franklin, Zona wasn't displeased.

He agreed the city schools will do all right against their Catholic rivals and pointed out that if he had his way 17 years ago there might be metropolitan football right now.

"Seventeen years ago I tried to get the county, city and Catholics together in football. The county just doesn't want it. But what a great league it would make," he added. Zona said the city's reorganization strengthened all its teams. Something like the rich got richer, however.

He said the Section 5 vote on the proposed 9th game (now permitted by the State) ended in a tie, 30-30, and would have to be held again.

The Section 5 constitution permits all members to vote although it was clearly recommended that schools without football teams refrain from voting.

He said the city schools voted 6-0 in favor; we assume the Catholic schools did likewise; but a number of other schools, some without football teams, voted against the proposal.

Murray was more concerned with kids hopping the fences and getting in for nothing instead of paying. Since the game was East's home game, Murray wouldn't let the Franklin players in after they returned from playing Mooney at Aquinas. (They snuck in anyway).

Zona told Don that when he was younger he used to chase the big kids, but he always let

the little kids in. Zona said he'd like to have a nickel for every kid who left a finger in the top of the fence at Franklin for sneaking in. They could have gotten in free.

Lander was scouting Mooney even though he won't play the Cards until next year. (His Madison team already beat the Quakers). "Got to stay a jump ahead," Lander said. He is doing OK isn't he?
