Final Guidelines Issued For Sanctuary Design

Changes in the Mass since Vatican II made it necessary to revamp the interiors of most Latin Rite Catholic churches, and the Liturgical Commission of the Rochester diocese has now released final guidelines for the design of churches and

The new "liturgical norms" apply to both permanent altera-tions of older structures and the planning of new churches.

In addition to the official norms based on the 1970 revised Roman Missal and a series of instructions from Rome, the diocesan Liturgical Commission appended a series of comments in its 20-page document released last week.

About the general principles of church design, the Commission's Committee on Art and Architecture commented, "Simplicity, spaciousness and good taste are the basic traits that a church should have to correspond with the spirit of the renewed liturgy."

However, the document points out, "Simplicity does not mean starkness; it means the absence of gaudy or pompous

More specific guidelines reg-ulate placement, construction and style of the "three points of focus within the sanctuary," the altar, the lectern and the presidential chair.

The altar, says the commission, "should be as close as possible to the center of the congregation, at least symbolical-

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ly." In contrast to past practice, "the altar-table can be designed in a variety of shapes."

The new regulations specify that all scriptural readings will be read from the lectern, which "is to the liturgy of the Word what the altar is to the liturgy of the Eucharist." Only one lectern is now allowed in each sanctuary.

The celebrant's chair, which the commission notes "is rather novel to most of us," will ideally be placed directly behind the altar on an elevated platform.

"The sole requirement" for art works in the church, says the document, "is that, old or new, they be truly artistic, for God deserves only that which is first-rate."

Multi-purpose churches which can be used as a church hall, auditorium and catechetical center have the approbation of the new norms, but building in this fashion, "obviously depends on its acceptability to the congregation."
