Rochester Missioner Goes to Ghana

Techny, Ill. — Brother Leon Abbey, SVD, a Divine Word Missionary, former member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Rochester, N.Y. recently flew to Ghana, West Africa to teach religion and sociology at Pope John XXIII Seminary in Effiduase.

Brother Abbey joined Divine Word Missionaries at Conesus, in 1958 and pronounced his vows there in 1965. He was awarded a B.A. degree by Gannon College, Erie, Pa. last May.

He is a son of Francis E. Abbey, 184 McCall Road, Rochester. His two brothers, Michael and Mark and three sisters, Barbara, Mary and Rita live at the McCall Road address. Another sister, Mrs. Robert (Katherine) Nivers lives in Florida.

This was, however, but a fractional list of the religious, social, and civic projects undertaken by the K of C in the 74 years since the local charter was granted in 1897.

The week of events began with a Mass and dedication ceremony in the new building Saturday afternoon, Oct. 9. In his remarks during the ceremony, Father Albert V. Ryan, pastor of St. James the Apostle Church in Trumansburg and chaplain for the council, compared the new headquarters to the homes which Christ had known in his lifetime, alike in that they were places where people could come together in a spirit of mutual understanding and affection. He cautioned the members to remain steadfast in their devotion to God and country at a time in history when these practices are neither easy nor always fashionable.

A dinner Saturday evening honored council members responsible for the new building. Guests of honor included Past State Deputy Hugh Doyle and State Advocate Thomas P. Ryan. Mayor Johns read his proclamation.

On Sunday, an open house and buffet was held for all area members and their guests. Special guests included State Deputy James A. Ruh, who addressed the group, and Supreme Director James E. Foley, a past state deputy.

On Tuesday evening, Oct. 12, the Knights entertained other fraternal organization members from the area at an evening reception. A special membership recruitment meeting Wednesday night featured an explanation of the group's activities and benefits.

Knighthood degrees were conferred in ceremonies Thursday evening, and a smoker was held Friday night. The weeks' activities were brought to a rousing conclusion Oct. 16 with round and square dancing at the new headquarters.

Professorship Established

Rochester Telephone and Rochester Institute of Technology have established a professorship in communications to foster research at RIT and to develop a diversified program in the communicating arts and sciences.

The professorship, to be named for the late William A. Kern, president of Rochester Telephone from 1959 until his death in 1964 and a former RIT trustee, is the first campus-wide chair in RIT's history.

Under terms of the agreement, Rochester Telephone will provide monies, salary, clerical assistance, and additional support for the chair over a five-year period. A selection committee, appointed by Dr. Paul A. Miller, RIT president, will be formed to search for "distinguished" candidates for the new post.
