Happy Birthday, Bishop Kearney

Happy Birthday, Bishop Kearney! Bishop James E. Kearney, that is.

As Bishop Kearney High School celebrated its tenth birthday during Kearney Week, the great man whom the school is named after celebrates his 87th birthday tomorrow, Oct. 28.

Bishop Kearney was born and

educated in New York City. He studied at Dunwoodie Seminary for the priesthood and was ordained in 1908. He acted as curate for a number of parishes in New York City and was appointed Pastor of St. Cecilia's in Spanish Harlem.

In 1932, also Oct. 28, he was consecrated as Bishop of Salt Lake, Utah. Five years later Bishop Kearney was chosen as fifth Bishop of Rochester. He remained Bishop of Rochester for 29 years until his retirement in 1966.

Bishop Kearney's accomplishments in the diocese are innumerable. The products of his work and determination are present throughout the city; his deep concern for the city's youth is viewed in the institutions he has built for them.

During the time the diocese was under his leadership and guidance, three high schools were built. McQuaid Jesuit High School, Cardinal Mooney High School, and Bishop Kearney High School are true evidence of the Bishop's great interest in the youth of today and of the future.

archy, though in union with Rome.

Dulin and Brother Joseph felt that the Vatican was hearing about American blacks for the first time, and was interested. But the upshot was that they were sent back to the U.S. bishops.

A statement released here Sunday, after a day and night of closed meetings, said:

"The failure of the American Bishops to respond to the needs of Black Americans gives indication that we as Black Catholics must continue with our present business of moving toward a Black Religious Rite."

Dulin, principal of the all-black St. Martin de Porres High School in Detroit, drew on this statement for an address during a lively celebration of the Mass Sunday morning.

"As black Catholics," he said, "we must apologize to our black brothers of other faiths, for we have failed them in their struggle for human rights. But there is a new day among us . . . and we know now that

we are black first and Catholic second."

In the words of the statement, "We hereby seek the support of all black organizations throughout America in our total struggle for survival in this racist country which is a conspiracy of Church and State aimed at oppressing black people."

The Mass with rousing music and banners bearing the likenesses of famous black heroes, was celebrated by Father Fred Hinton of Buffalo. The Sign of Peace rippled back and forth through the black and white congregation, and at the end Father Hinton spoke briefly, asking for the prayers, understanding and help of "our white friends."

The state meeting attracted about 100 delegates from caucuses in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Long Island communities; Albany, Buffalo and Rochester. National board members came from as far away as Seattle. The Immaculate Conception convent was turned over to their use, some of the out-towners were house guests in the area and meals were served in the parish hall.
