

# Glick Urges Anti-War Activity

Ted Glick is in Rochester for two reasons, he told newsmen recently at a press conference at the metro-act offices, 277 N. Goodman St.

Three weeks ago he was released from a federal prison in Danbury, Conn., on appeal after serving 11 months for an act that took place here and he is here to visit friends. Second, he is urging people to become involved in anti-war activity Oct. 22-25, sponsored by the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice in Washington, D.C.

This is his first appearance in Rochester since his conviction last November (as a member of the Flower City Conspiracy) for destroying draft files in the Federal Building.

Glick is 21, the youngest of the so-called Harrisburg 8 whose trial was tentatively set last week for Jan. 10, 1972. The "8" are charged with a conspir-

acy to kidnap Henry Kissinger.

He is the son of the president of Keuka College, Penn Yan, and was one of 11 individuals at Danbury Prison known as the Danbury resisters who fasted for 30 days to bring attention to what they considered the inequity and injustice of the U.S. parole board. Another of the fasters was Father Phillip Berrigan, a co-defendant in the Harrisburg indictment.

When asked about his father's feelings in the matters involved, Glick replied that his father supported him in all his beliefs and subsequent activities, and his father in turn has received the support of the board of trustees of Keuka College. His father wrote an article entitled, "Laws of State and Laws of God," which will appear in the Christian Century.

Glick said, "if there aren't major changes in the country's ideas then 1984 will come true.

The trend is toward totalitarian government; the use of informers, illegal wiretapping and the growing misuse of grand juries, all pointing to a more repressive society."

Glick explained that the only way to stop this trend is for people to change their values and priorities, in turn institutions will change.

When asked about the effect of the 30-day hunger strike, he said: "It affected people on the outside by heightening their awareness and also, as a direct result of the attention we brought to the injustices of the federal parole system, an open hearing is going to take place in Washington.

"What is needed is long-term campaign to change institutions. If the war is ended I will continue my involvement," he explained, "because it is just one aspect of a total system that uses people, where human life is secondary."

## Valley Manor Apartments Open

Rochester is nearly halfway toward its goal for the 1970s of 15,000 senior citizen housing units — 7,464 units for the elderly are either in construction, approved or in process, Mayor Stephen May announced recently.

Speaking at the dedication of Valley Manor Apartment Hotel, 1570 East Ave., Oct. 17, May emphasized the need for a "total community commitment to meet the special needs" of Rochester's large and growing aged population. He believes housing deserves number one priority, and said the progress made in the past two years demonstrates the attempt to provide living choices for Rochester's 40,000 senior citizens.

Rochester has the highest percentage of over-65 residents of any city in the U.S.

complex is the only one of its kind in upstate New York. It is a retirement community for people 62 and older, and is a project of the Presbyterian Residence Center Corporation.

B. W. Johnson, manager of the apartment, explained that people buy apartments on a life-lease basis. The apartments cost from \$7,500 to \$30,500, plus a monthly maintenance fee ranging from \$360 to \$700 for a two-bedroom, two-bath apartment.

Included in the maintenance fee are two meals a day, complete maid service and a complete health center which includes a nurse on duty 24 hours.

Charles W. Carson, past president of Community Savings Bank and a member of the Valley Manor board of directors, opened the dedication ceremony. Others who participated:

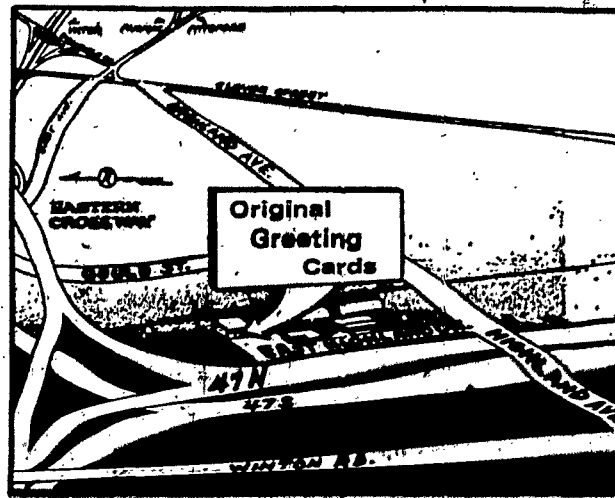
