The "whopping" the Little Irish suffered at the hands of unbeaten Madison won't be easily forgotten.

Ex-Aquinas griddier (and former BK head coach) Dan Coughlin wasn't going to watch what the Times-Union's Ray Buck dubbed the "Poll Bowl" game. Dan intended to stay home and watch Nebraska on TV instead.

He heard Aquinas was losing at halftime and raced over to view the second half of the execution. (Madison won, 38-18).

In the closing minutes of the third period (Madison led, 26-12) Billy Grief, another former Aquinas star of 20 years ago, walked by.

"My God, how bad have we gone?" Dan said to Billy.

It isn't a question of "how bad" Aquinas has gone since the days of Boys Town prep schools and fifth-year students. It's a combination of how Aquinas has returned to an "honest" level of football comparable to its city and county brethren

while at the same time the caliber of city league football has improved to the point where a city's team can't only compete with the Irish, but "whup" them on its own terms in its own ball park.

**MOST OF THE CREDIT** for the realization that Aquinas is no longer area "superpower" goes to Madison's Don Lander, the quiet head coach who said in the beginning of the season that he believed his Wilson Parkers were the best around.

Was Aquinas overconfident? More than a month before the big game AQ head coach Bob Rosmarino said his Irish were at least two or three touchdowns better than Madison.

Rosmarino, whose colleagues shudder when he utters, should be a little quieter these days.

The game drew more than 13,000 fans, by far the largest crowd of any game in the Rochester area this season and possibly one of the biggest crowds of the season in the state. Corcoran of Syracuse defeated Au-

burn 16-7 before 7700 and Vestal (No. 1 in state) edged Union-Endicott 13-9 before 10,000 on the same day.

Despite the shocking defeat (we picked Aquinas and that shows what we know) Aquinas remained in the Top 20 in the state but dropped to 14th; Madison was 8th. And nowhere in the Top 20 was an entry from the suburban County League—a notable achievement which should tell you something.
