"I am aware quite often good players from small schools do not have the publicity they often earn. Please keep this player in mind," writes a reader from Geneva.

The player, DeSales fullback John Corcoran, is well known in the Geneva area and equally unknown outside of Ontario County.

Corcoran, who graduates this June, was good for 20 carries a game, ground out about 110 yards per game on the average and hit a high of three TD's against Marcus Whitman this season.

Last year as a member of DeSales' turn-around squad (the Saints turned around from an 0-8 disaster to become league champion) Corcoran led the Wayne-Finger Lakes circuit with 450 yards gained and scored eight times.

WE SUPPOSE for the purpose of getting more boys recognition, the City-Catholic League broke its all-star football team in "City" and "Catholic" teams, and we're not sure either which way the league officially kept its standings — the Times-Union ran them all season as separate leagues while the Democrat and Chronicle combined them.

Anyway, Aquinas, Catholic League champion or City-Catholic runnerup, depending on the newspaper you read, placed 10 players on the 23-man offensive-defensive Catholic League Squad.

Leading the Irish selections was sophomore halfback Bob Imes who gained 985 yards on the ground in 172 carries for a 5.7 average, besides scoring four touchdowns and running two extra points.

Another sophomore, Tony Shaw, of Cardinal Mooney, also was a first team choice. Shaw totaled 550 yards in 111 carries and added another 244 yards on pass receptions, in addition to scoring nine touchdowns.

Aquinas' Dennis Damaschke (who scored eight TD's and five extra points) tied with Bishop Kearney's Paul Adamo (who completed 86 of 163 passes for 1,180 yards) for quarterback honors.

Kearney's Don Reinhardt, a senior-end, was an easy choice, with eight TD's and three extra points to his credit.

Wayland — Mrs. Leonard (Pauline) Gessner ended a long political career Tuesday night, Nov. 2 when the election books were closed. Pauline served her last stint as a member of the Board of Election Inspectors in District 1 in the Wayland Town Hall Tuesday. At 75 years of age, she resigned from the post she held by appointment for 35 years.

Pauline replaced the late Robert Scales on the board back in 1936 and created the first all woman board in Wayland. The other members are now deceased.

Pauline and her husband are probably the community's most avid promoters of the annual Cancer Crusade and both are directors of the Steuben County Chapter of the American Cancer Society and are parishioners of St. Joseph's in Wayland.

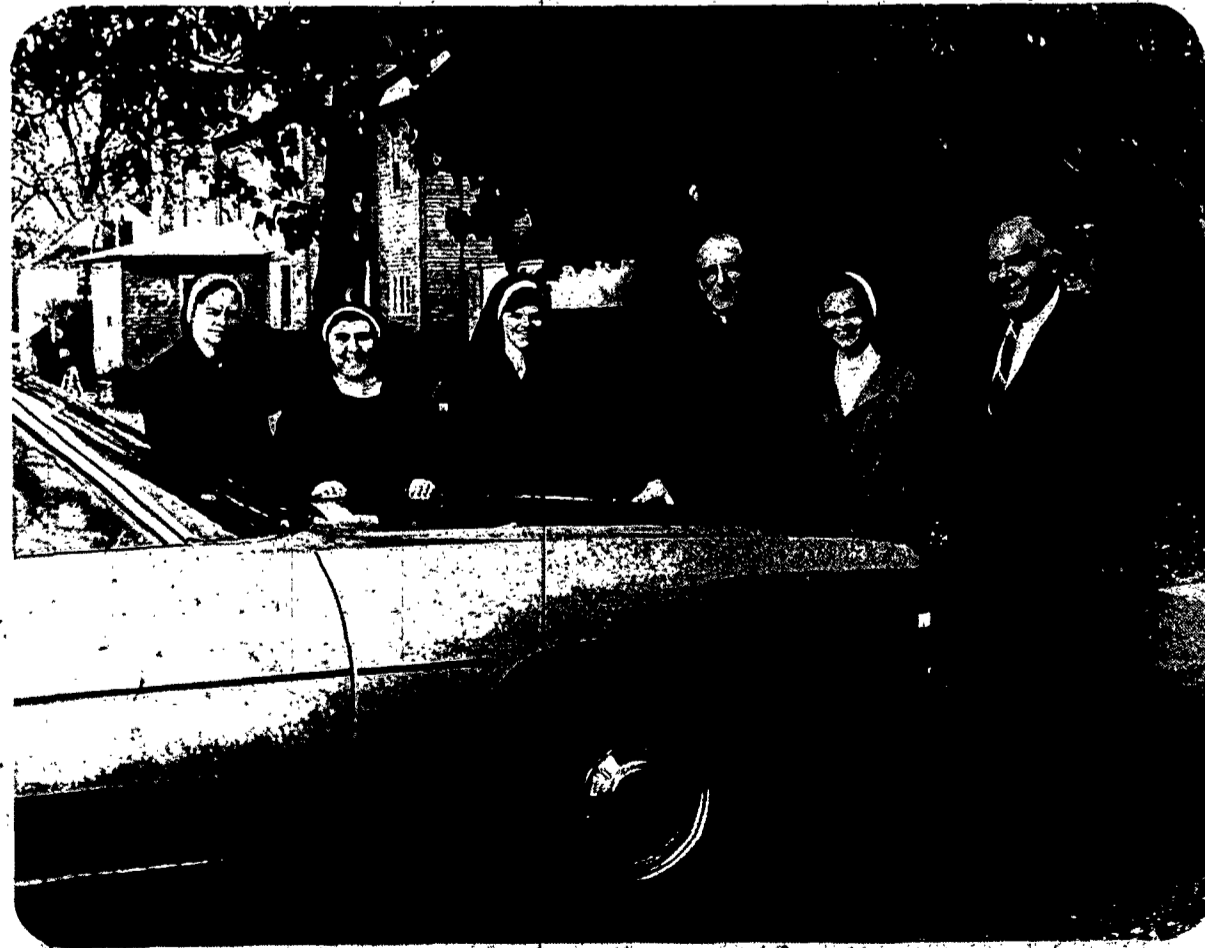
