\$1,000 Reward Offered In Carmen Colon Case

The Citizens for a Decent Community (CDC) are offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the slayer of 10-year-old Carmen Colon.

The CDC has set guidelines for anyone with information who wishes to remain anonymous. The information should be written on paper and the writer should choose any sequence of five numbers and put them (the same sequence) on the top and bottom. The writer should then tear off the bottom to keep for identification purposes.

FISH Offers Area A Chance to Help

The Fish needs help.

Friends In Service Here is an ecumenical, apolitical community service organization that needs volunteers.

The international organization which began in England, operates under the name and symbol of The Fish. It is the same symbol as that used by early Christians during centuries of persecution to identify themselves to each other.

The members of this group today are simply people who express their love and concern for their neighbors.

The Southwest Ecumenical Ministry decided to establish a chapter of this organization in the 19th Ward two years ago. Now they receive an average of 170 calls a month from people who need help of any kind.

Mrs. Catherine Bedford of Arnett Boulevard who is a member of the steering committee that works out of Westminster Church, describes FISH as "Christ in action."

The workings of the average FISH chapter are as direct and uncomplicated as its organization. Each volunteer sets aside one 24-hour period a month during which time he or she will be available.

Most FISH services require no special talent or money. They range from baby sitting, reading to the blind, to driving people to doctors, dentists and stores. There is no charge.

"The 19th Ward is, for the most part, senior citizens on Social Security who can't afford taxis," Mrs. Bedford pointed out.

FISH often channels calls to either county or community agencies that are more specialized. Mrs. Bedford explained the relationship of FISH to other agencies: "We are careful not to overlap any existing agencies; we are here to pick up where they leave off."

St. Ambrose Parish Notes Anniversary

St. Ambrose Parish, Rochester, celebrates its 50th anniversary Sunday, Dec. 5.

Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey will be the principal concelebrant at Mass scheduled for 5 p.m. A reception will follow the Mass in the parish's Dailey Hall.

The parish was incorporated Nov. 12, 1921. Two days previous the first pastor, Father Walter B. McCarthy, was appointed; and 14 days later the first church, a wood frame building was ready for worship. The parish's first Mass was celebrated Dec. 11.

Father McCarthy served as pastor until his death in 1936. The late Father John J. Burke was named administrator of the parish until 1937, when Father Frank W. Mason was appointed the second pastor.

During Father Mason's pastorate a convent and a new church were built. Bishop

James E. Kearney honored Father Mason with the title of right reverend monsignor in 1959.

Msgr. Arthur E. Ratigan was named pastor of St. Ambrose in 1963. A year before, a spectacular Sunday morning fire destroyed the parish school. A new school was dedicated in 1964.

During Msgr. Ratigan's pastorate, a Parish School Board, one of the first of its kind in the diocese, was organized. Also organized have been a youth choir and folk Mass and a parish council.

Msgr. Ratigan became the first Rochester pastor to relinquish his position to become assistant pastor at another church this Fall.

The present pastor is Father James Marvin. He is assisted by Father Mark Miller. The Sisters of St. Joseph staff the school.
