Sister Celeste

A concelebrated Mass of the Resurrection was offered at St. Margaret Mary Church for Sister Celeste Kuehne of the School Sisters of Notre Dame, who died at St. Mary's Hospital on Nov. 16, 1971.

Sister Celeste, 73, had celebrated her golden jubilee last year. Fifty years as a teacher of grades 7 and 8 were spent in New York City, Philadelphia, Camden, N.J. and in the diocese of Rochester — 12 years at St. Peter and Paul and 6 years at St. Michael. For the past year and a half, Sister Celeste had done private tutoring at St. Margaret Mary School.

She was a native of Rochester. She leaves a sister, Mrs. Mary Diesel and a brother, Joseph Kuehne, both of Rochester; two nephews and a niece.

Joseph Wilson

Memorial services were held for Joseph C. Wilson at St. Thomas More Church, Wednesday Nov. 24. Mr. Wilson died suddenly Monday, Nov. 22. Father Francis Pegnam, pastor of the church, Father Charles Lavery, president of St. John Fisher College and Bishop James E. Kearney led the rites.

Mr. Wilson was board chairman of Xerox Corp. He was a member of the Genesee Valley club, the Rochester club, the University Club of Rochester. He was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters by Le Moyne college in 1965, and a Doctor of Laws from St. John Fisher College in 1967. He was also the recipient of several other degrees and a member of several other organizations.

He is survived by his wife, Marie Curran Wilson; five daughters, Mrs. R. Thomas (Joan) Dalbey, Mrs. Christian G. (Katherine) Kling, Miss Judith Ann Wilson, Mrs. Joseph (Dierdre) Garton, Miss J. Christine Wilson; one son, J. Richard Wilson; one brother, Richard U. Wilson, five grandsons and six granddaughters.
