ond grade, children exhibited their papers in spelling, mathe-matics, and phonics on a bulletin board interspersed with lacebearded Santas.

Life in the desert was contrasted with life in Hornell in Mrs. Rita Apel's third grade, Stand-up paper cutouts illus-trated the local business; industrial and residential sections. Each child had drawn his own home in the residential section of the large mural.

Pupils in Mrs. Eleanor Murphy's fourth grade worked in groups to compile several "So-cial Studies Pictionaries." The children collected pictures il-lustrating geographical terms and historical events.

A study of the economic effect of the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Seaway on industrial development was illustrated in Mrs. Ruth Bishop's fifth grade. The children drew a large map with pictures showing various types of industry.

An international flavor was imparted to the Christmas bulletin board in Mrs. Mary Frances Dunning's sixth grade. Children had captioned the arrangement of yuletide symbols with

"Merry Christmas" in 12 languages. A stylized Christmas tree nearby bore as ornaments the pupils' pictures.

Iroquois culture was the theme of a social studies project in Sister Mary Ambrose's seventh grade. Table models of Indian villages and booklets showing various facets of Iroquois life were prepared by class committees. They were displayed against a background of original drawings of the Indian calendar contrasted with the Gregorian calendar and that of today.

In Sister Mary Jude's eighth grade, Indian studies were carried out with emphasis on local history. 'A large scale exhibit entitled "From Longhouse to Apartment House" showed the development of family life from early to modern times. Each child included in his own longhouse the members of his ex-tended family group,

Sister Mary Patrice's music room bore a huge mural illustrating Chrismas carols through gold angels, wreaths and trees. It also featured an Advent bulletin board in purple and pink bearing Old Testament prophesies.
