St. Ann's School Holds Open House

Hornell—A preview of Christmas was given hundreds of parents and friends of St. Ann's School Sunday, Dec. 5, as they attended the annual holiday open house. Classrooms, all open for inspection, showed academic progress as well as a variety of art. In each room the purple of the Advent season contrasted with the Christmas motif.

Every room had its own interpretation of the Nativity Scene. Some were simple hand-drawn cribs and others were life size portraits of the Holy Family in crayons and pastel chalk.

A room-length mural of "Santa's Toy Shop" in Mrs. Patricia O'Neil's kindergarten was centered with a giant letter to Santa recommending a special gift for each child.

"Snoopy," wearing a Christmas hat instead of his World War I flying gear, welcomed persons to Sister Mary Denise's first grade. Words for special study in vocabulary development were listed beneath a border of hand made dancing Santas joined by red and green paper chains.

In Mrs. Betty Rahmlow's sec-

ond grade, children exhibited their papers in spelling, mathematics, and phonics on a bulletin board interspersed with lace-bearded Santas.

Life in the desert was contrasted with life in Hornell in Mrs. Rita Apel's third grade. Stand-up paper cutouts illustrated the local business, industrial and residential sections. Each child had drawn his own home in the residential section of the large mural.

Pupils in Mrs. Eleanor Murphy's fourth grade worked in groups to compile several "Social Studies Pictionaries." The children collected pictures illustrating geographical terms and historical events.
