Perhaps the Rochester Catholic schools should award Ray Laws, Channel 13 news director, a medal, a sort of "defender of the faith" type, for his recent commentary blasting Section 5 public schools for "continuing to bar parochial and private schools from its tournaments."

Laws, in a moving minute's worth of "One Man's Opinion," crystallized the problem eloquently and simply by attacking the Archie Bunkers of Section 5 for their secret vote which turned down the Catholics' request to participate in such tournaments on a state OK'd, two-year experimental basis.

"In the world of sports with all its democratic principles," Laws said, "with Jackie Robinson's rapid disintegration of the color line, with the idea of bringing people together, the prejudices of (many) of the public school personnel have not been erased.

"Representatives of 130 schools, their reasons not given, turned down the Catholic schools' bid . . . the voting was conducted by secret ballot . . . only school officials, not taxpayers participated in the vote" Laws told the TV audience.

"The public and non-public schools play each other regularly during the season but a true test of superiority is ruled out by preventing the parochial and private schools from join-

ing the tournaments," Laws said.

He added this clincher: "Taxpayers should take to task school officials for unsportsmanlike conduct."

We applaud Laws for his stand; we applaud D&C sports-writer Jim Rickey for suggesting Section 5 be "spanked" for its action; we wait for the Times-Union, in the interests of keeping readers informed, to present its comment.
