Anglicans, Romans Said in Agreement Over Eucharist

London — (RNS) — Substantial Anglican-Roman Catholic agreement on the doctrine of the Eucharist, whereby a major obstacle to unity could be cleared, was reported in a series of important joint statements published here.

The main document was an "Agreed Statement on Eucharistic Doctrine" which was drafted at the third meeting of the top-level Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission at Windsor last Sept. 7. Pope Paul and Anglican Archbishop Michael Ramsey of Canterbury have agreed to publication of the document as a basis for continuing study.

After setting forth the theological reasoning which led to the agreement, the statement by the full commission concludes: "We believe that we have

"We believe that we have reached substantial agreement on the doctrine of the Eucharist....

"We acknowledge a variety of theological approaches with# in both our communions. But

we have seen it as our task to find a way of advancing together beyond the doctrinal disagreements of the past. It is our hope that in view of the agreement which we have reached on eucharistic faith, this doctrine will no longer constitute an obstacle to the unity we seek."

The agreement hinges on two pivots. The first is the agreement to see the Eucharist as a memorial, or "anamnesis," of the life, death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ, who established the memorial to make present and real His historic sacrifice each time the Eucharist is celebrated. Through the prayer of the Eucharist, the worshipper becomes actively involved in Christ's sacrifice; he is offered to God with Christ, and the peace and reconciliation won by Christ become his own.

The second pivot is the agreement reached that Christ is really present in the Eugerist—independently of what the

Bishop asks Help For Bosco House

My Dear People:

Six months ago I established, within our Educational Department, the Division of Special Religious Education for the Handicapped, with headquarters at Bosco House on Buffalo Road in Rochester.

In addition to providing information on the nature and needs of the handicapped to clergy, religious and laity, the basic objective of this operation is to minister to the spiritual and emotional needs of the handicapped and their families throughout the diocese. After training a staff for the purpose, this will eventually be accomplished through the establishment of regional centers throughout the diocese.

It is estimated that there are about 40,000 handicapped people in our diocesan family. We need more than estimates in order to help them. Therefore, I am enlisting your help in gathering the necessary information.

If you have in your family or household a Catholic who is handicapped in any way, please fill out a copy of the survey questionnaire provided for you today. Kindly turn it in at church next Sunday or send it directly to Bosco House.
