Vatican Again Criticizes Violence in Ireland

Vatican City — (RNS) — Against a background of unabating violence in Northern Ireland, Vatican Radio restated what it called the "already well-known" attitude of the Holy See on "the Irish question."

"The Holy See," said the broadcast, "relying on the teachings of the Gospel, has always condemned and still condemns terror, violence and intimidation from whatever source and by whomsoever they are exercised."

It said the Vatican, "together with the local (Irish) hierarchy," has consistently stressed to "the interested parties" that "it is not through violence and the bitter repression of violence, but only through justice and love that a suitable solution can be found to the grave problems" of the people of Northern Ireland.

Vatican observers saw in the reference to "violence" and the "repression of violence," a sharp denunciation of the terorist campaign of the "provisionals" of the illegal Irish Republican Army (IRA), and of certain measures taken by the Ulster and British authorities to meet this violence, including what a British government called the "ill-treatment" of IRA prisoners.

Meanwhile, in an interview published in the Italian bl-weekly review, Rocca, Cardinal William Conway, Primate of All Ireland, said that although the Catholic minority in Northern Ireland "has the right to social and political justice," it is a "grave mistake to have recourse to violence to achieve this end."

"This policy has been declared publicly more than 30 times in the last three years." he said, "and has been accepted by the great majority of Catholics."

Vatican City (RNS) — The Vatican Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples, which directs and coordinates missionary activity throughout the world, marked the \$50th anniversary of its founding on the feast of the Epiphany.

The agency now overseas 135,508 missioners who work among 51 million Catholics in mission areas throughout the world.

Pope Gregory XV established on Jan. 6, 1622 a permanent congregation of cardinals to have supreme control over all foreign missions, and direct work for unity with Protestant and Orthodox Churches. The agency was called the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith.

Vatican City — (RNS) — Responses to Pope Paul's World Peace Day message of Jan. 1 Continue to flow into the Vatican from heads of state and from Orthodox and Protestant Church leaders, Vatican Radio reported. The broadcast quoted French President Georges Pompidou thus:

"While different continents are lacerated by murderous con-

flicts, and nations are undergoing a period of anxiety in the face of future uncertainties, people of every religious belief cannot but rejoice at this appeal, which is so lucid and full of hope, reasonableness and charity."

Vatican Radio said laudatory messages had been received from Patriarch Ignatius Jacob III. of the Syrian Orthodox Church of Antioch (Jacobite) and All the East; Patriarch Benedictos I of the Greek Orthodox Church in Jerusalem, and the Rev. Edmond Perret, general secretary of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, Geneva.

The central theme of the 1972 papal-sponsored World Peace Day was "If you want peace, work for justice."
