Pre - Cana Improves Communications

Pre-Cana, the program of marriage preparation for engaged couples that has been in existence for 20 years, is changing. Traditionally it has been four, 90-minute lecture sessions, with two sessions run by married couples, one by a priest and one by a doctor.

There has always been a large diverse group attending, with no opportunity for active participation, and this has proven unsatisfactory, according to Father Robert Collins, director of the Family Life Office. Accordingly, a new format is being introduced this year in 14 locations throughout the diocese.

Father John Fournier of Providence, R.I., developed the new program. Twenty-five couples take part, in groups of five couples which meet for four two-hour sessions in one week under the direction of one married couple.

This program is unique in two ways: pre-registration is required in the hopes of getting a homogeneous group for each session; and each session is different since the program depends completely on maximum involvement of the engaged couples attending.

The same topics of discussion are touched upon: spirituality of the sacrament of marriage. sexuality, communication, budgeting, and in-laws, but not just as items in a lecture.

The married couples who conduct the Fournier program take part in an eight-week training program. They work up a 10-minute presentation and a minute by minute timetable for the four meetings.

A session begins with questions the married couples came up with from their own experiences. The engaged couples reflect on what they would do in the same situations, they take part in role-playing, and they discuss their own goals and thoughts on marriage.

As a result of this format, Father Collins reported: "I know from the Providence office that couples have decided of themselves that they are not mature enough to be married."

The Fournier program is primarily for those between 21 and 24 years old. There is an intensive pre-Cana program for couples under legal age and another new program is being tried for couples 25 and older.

Diocese, Bosco House Start Handicapped Survey


