## Priestly Spirituality Aim of New Committee

A Priestly Spirituality Committee has been formed to assist Bishop Joseph E. Hogan in planning yearly retreats, houses of prayer and shared prayer

opportunities for priests of the diocese.

The committee will try to provide varied retreat formats and prayer conferences to meet the needs of the modern day priest. Father Robert Collins, director of the Family Life Office who serves as chairman of the new committee, reported that in June a conference will be conducted by a retreat master with time for private prayer at Becket Hall.

Another format, which will be available in November at the Notre Dame Retreat House, is a Movement for a Better World retreat which emphasizes community spirituality with group discussion and interaction.

Father Collins explained that the committee grew out of a concern among the priests over the great amount of time every day they spend in active ministry. "We are looking for a kind of prayer life that fits the post-Vatican II priest. Many priests are not satisfied with the old way," he said.

A house of prayer is a place where groups of priests can go for spiritual direction, counseling and days of recollection. Shared prayer or dialogue prayer is a group experience of spontaneous prayer.

Working with Father Collins on the Priestly Spirituality Committee are: Monsignor Robert A. Keleher of St. Charles Borromeo; Father Edward Callens and Father William Trott, spiritual directors at St. Bernard's Seminary; Father Gerald Connor, spiritual director at Becket Hall; Father Thomas Reddington, of Holy Name in Greece; Father William Gordinier, of Guardian Angels in Henrietta; and Deacon John Zimmerman of St. Christopher's in Chili.

## Father Bartlett Among Names On Youth Board

The new appointees are Miss Carmen Delgado and Father Albert Bartlett. Miss Delgado will fill the unexpired term of Domingo Martinez which lasts until December 31, 1974. Father Bartlett succeeds Lyndon Wells and will serve a full four-year term ending Dec. 31, 1975.

Reappointed to four-year terms ending Dec. 31, 1975, are Mrs. Daniel Arensmeier and Arthur Ferrell. They are in their first year on the board.

Ferrari said: "Miss Delgado and Father Bartlett have special training and knowledge of urban and suburban youth and so are highly qualified to serve on the board."

Father Bartlett has been Rector of McQuaid Jesuit High School since June 1966. He has taught English, classics and theology in high school. He has a bachelor's and master's degree from Fordham University and a doctorate from the University of Buffalo. He is vice president of the City Club of Rochester.
