Young Artists Organize

Four McQuaid seniors have organized a youth council for the development of greater student appreciation and involvement in art. Dave Cerrand, Terry Brownell, Ken Sigmund and Paul Davison have named the organization Coalition of Young Artists.

They have been working with Mrs. Patricia Wild, director of research and funding for the Arts Council of Rochester, 375 Westfall Road, but the coalition will be an independent organization. "And knowing the people involved," Mrs. Wild said, "I know it will be terribly independent."

The organizational work included trips to the various art galleries and museums in Ro-

chester to discuss programs and set up students rates.

The goals and possibilities of the Coalition are: recognition of the Coalition of Young Artists as a group for the benefit of student artists; seminars between locally and nationally recognized artists and local high school students; workshops where locally recognized artists can give demonstrations of the techniques and styles of their crafts; shows of local arts in area high schools; high school students exhibiting their own work in other high schools; quarterly shows and exhibits which would give students a chance to sell their work; student involvement on an active basis through possible appren-

ticeship and monthly periodicals which would contain articles, concert information, an activities calendar and ticket information.

In the open division, Debbie Shannon, a seventh grader at Our Lady of Good Council School took the 50 yard free style in 30:8 and the 200 yard intermediate medley in 2:59.

In the prep division, Eileen Smith, a seventh grader at St. James School, did the 50 yard breast stroke in 42:0 and Margaret Tuttle, a seventh grader at Sacred Heart School, did the 100 yard free style in 1:11.

Midget division swimmers are considered to be top league contenders since they upset Gene-
