Jaycees Hold Interfaith Meal

Auburn - Auburn Jaycees President, Paul Barrus, kicked off the first of Jaycee week activities, an interfaith breakfast for area clergymen, Saturday, Jan. 15 in the Jaycee Club-rooms, 7 E. Genesee St.

'Can our organization's manpower and enthusiasm be used to advantage?" was a key theme behind this first in a series of interfaith breakfasts planned by the Auburn Chapter as they seek new avenues of service to the community. The meeting offered the Jaycees and area clergy the opportunity to identify some of the social problems in the community that the Auburn Jaycee organization, through its volunteer manpower, could help resolve.

Emphasis focused on the need of coordination of service to avoid duplication of efforts and to insure greater effort behind the priorities established within the community.

The Jaycees, a national organization composed of men between 21 and 36 from varied occupations, is entering its 53rd year nationally, and 23rd year in Auburn.

Speaking before the group was special guest David Miller, New York Jaycee State Chaplain from Niagara Falls, who explained how the role of the organization has evolved from social functions to one where community needs are sought out and young men trained for leadership roles through participation in community projects.

Jaycee spokesmen also pointed out the state level can assist in passing along guidelines helpful in local communities, and the organization is concerned with all aspects of social problems.


