planners and the council agreed that the Church planners should represent the voice of

the people. Representing the Sister's Maintenance Committee, Father Albert Bartlett, recommended a raise in salary from \$2150 a year to \$2450 a year for the priests' consideration before making out their new budgets.

Father Bartlett reported that of the eight dioceses in the state Rochester is the second lowest in nuns compensation.

This prompted a general discussion of the education crisis.

Father Mulligan suggested that "the feeling we have is one of going bankrupt and un-

### less we settle the school problem we will be feeling this way for a long time." And he urged that they "stop making crisis to crisis decisions."

Father Joseph Brennan, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary, explained that it is basically a question of figuring out who is responsible for making the de-cision on the future of the schools.

"We don't make any deci-sions about anything," Father Brennan said, "we are like the king in the Little Prince who commands the sun to set, after it has set.'

Further discussion on the salary increase was tabled until the March meeting.

## John L. Neary


John L. Neary died Jan. 29, 1972, at his Sherwood Avenue home.
