

Father Bauer's New Book

Homilies for Your Children

Little Lessons to Live By, by E. Charles Bauer (Concord-ia; 1972)

When bulldozing nonsense out of seminarians' heads, the late professor of education at St. Bernard's Seminary, Msgr. Joseph Grady, constantly cited the work and writings of his pupil Charlie Bauer, as exemplary of imitation for anyone seriously engaged in communication.

Father Bauer, the director of Rochester's Bosco House, a center for educating and ministering to the spiritual needs of the handicapped, has a new book out which certainly would have won Msgr. Grady's plaudits and already has captured kudos from no less than Arch-bishop Fulton Sheen and the eminent Lutheran preacher, Dr. Oswald C. J. Hoffmann.

Little Lessons is a book of homilies for each Sunday in the Church year and its major festivals. What makes the book different is that the homilies are geared to children.

In reminding his youthful audience that "God Will Always Take Care of You," Father Bauer finds an easily grasped lead into the subject of divine providence:

"Radar is a great big electric eye that can 'see' planes and bombs and rockets that might be sent to kill us. These big machines that our country has all over are always 'watching over' us so we won't get hurt. They are 'watching' day and night so that the enemy cannot get at us.
