Stay in the Habit, Vatican Advice To U.S. Religious

Except in special cases, Roman Catholic religious and priests should wear the prescribed habit, Roman collar or other "appropriate visible sign" to dis-tinguish them from the "clearly secular," a Vatican congregation has informed the U.S. bish-

In a communication to the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB), the Vatican Congregation for Religious and Secular Institutes cited a Vatican II decree which it said regards religious garb as "a sign of consecration for those who have embraced in a public way the state of perfection of the evangelical counsels."

The congregation's directive, which appeared to be aimed to a large extent at priests and religious in the U.S., was forwarded by Archbishop Luigi Raimondi, Apostolic Delegate in the U.S., to Cardinal John Krol of Philadelphia, president of the NCCB.

Acknowledging that general chapters of religious orders may modify traditional garb according to practical requirements, the congregation's directive de-clared "they may not abolish it altogether" nor may they allow the individual religious to determine whether they will or will not wear it.

On the other hand, "purely secular clothes, without any recognizable exterior sign, can be permitted, for particular reasons, . . . to those Sisters to whom the use of the religious habit would constitute an impediment or obstacle in the normal exercise of (necessary) activities . . .

The directive stated, however, that even when secular clothes are worn, religious women should not depart from forms of "poverty, simplicity and modesty" proper to their state. "It should always be in some way different from the forms that


