Yarn is being dyed before it is woven into clothing, left, by Dave Veltre, lifting string out of pot, and Frank Nardone. The spun yarn, originally a light white color, becomes gold when boiled with onion skins. It is then transferred to cold water and dried.

Other projects undertaken under the direction of Sister Diana Dolce, SSJ were leather-smithing, carpentry, construction of a blacksmith shop and making a patchwork quilt for a typical home of the time.

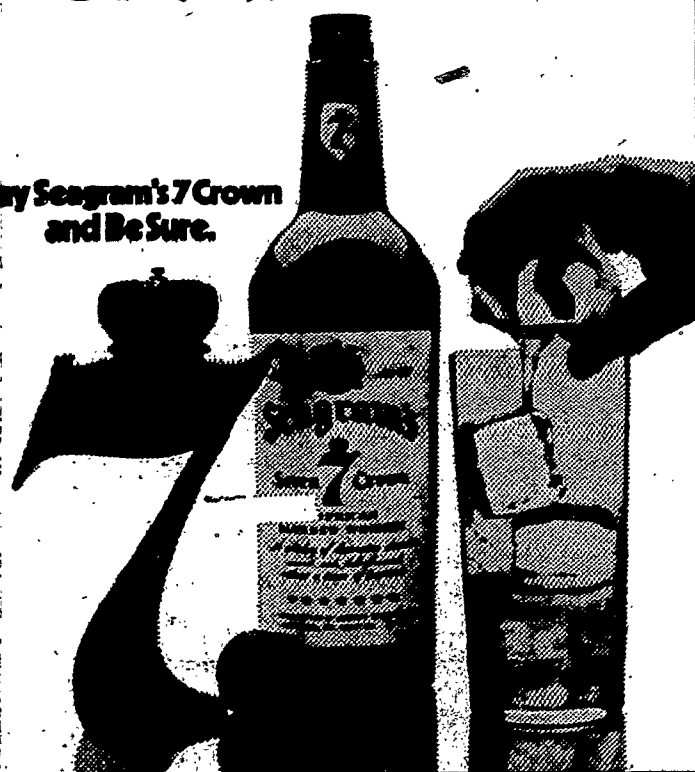
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Father Neu Speaks To Women's Group

Hornell — Father Leon Neu conducted a Night of Recollection for members of St. Ann's Mother's Club recently.

Father Neu, pastor of St. Brendan's Church in Almond and St. Mary's Church in Canaseraga, led the group in readings and prayers.
