Catholic School Seniors
Win 177 Regents Awards

Regents college scholarships have been offered to 168 seniors in the nine Catholic high schools of the diocese, on the basis of scores in a state-wide examination. The awards are worth from \$250 to \$1,000 a year, depending on family income, and are good for five years of college study in New York State.

In addition, through the same examination, nine Catholic high school students won awards for basic professional education in nursing. These are worth \$200 to \$500 a year. Each scholarship winner has access also to as much as \$600 a year "incentive" assistance, depending upon need.

Among the nursing scholarship winners is Robert P. Kempf of McQuaid Jesuit High School. The others are Anne Ceranowicz, Karen Cirel Marie Droel, Angela Passaretti and Deborah Schweigert, all of Bishop Kearney High School; Cynthia Fields, Our Lady of Mercy; Ellen Kern, St. Agnes, and Patricia Grau, De Sales.

High scores were achieved by Kevin R. Murphy of Aquinas Institute, who came in fifth among the 790 Monroe County winners and Patrick D. Sweeney of De Sales High School,

Geneva, fifth among 94 in Ontario County.
