From March 2 through 8 the Afro-American Sickle Cell Association, Inc. the Community Health Unit of the University of Rochester Department of Preventive Medicine, and Rochester Institute of Technology Extension Services are sponsoring activities ranging from speeches to dramatic presentations, a dinner and a subscription drive.

Tomorrow, March 2, a presentation by three "sicklers", a doctor, and a public health nurse will be given at RIT Extension Services, 50 West Main on "Sickle Cell Anemia: The Response and the Responsibility."The program will run from 10 a.m. until noon.

Friday, March 3 at 7 p.m. there will be poetry, drama, song and dance in "A Health Message" at the Phyllis Wheatley Library, 13 Bronson Ave.

On Saturday, March 4, a spring dinner to benefit the Afro-American Sickle Cell Association will be held at Immaculate Conception, South Plymouth at Edinburgh St., from 5 to 9 p.m.

Douglas Stewart, director of community affairs for Planned Parenthood, will speak on "Sickle Cell Anemia: Trait or Trick" at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, March 5, at Holy Trinity Baptist Church, 397 North St.

The fund drive will be March 6-8. Funds will be used to expand and develop educational programs in sickle cell anemia; to test Afro-Americans in Rochester for the disease; to plan develop and execute programs to meet the health and social needs of those affected and to encourage applied research and service projects.
