

# Collegians Air Religion On Ithaca Radio

Ithaca — A new show is on the air waves. Probe, sponsored by Ithaca College, examines contemporary religious problems, concerns and attitudes. It is aired Sundays at 10 a.m. on WICB-FM (91.7).

The three major religious groups at Ithaca College are the contributors, and each is free to develop its own style and format. Before Probe was created, WICB was using "canned" religious programs to fulfill a weekly program obligation according to the Rev. George E. Clarkson, chaplain for the campus United Christian Fellowship organization. Realizing that local talent was going unused WICB recruited the chaplains. Joining Rev. Clarkson are Rabbi Morris Goldfarb of B'nai B'rith Hillel and Father Phillip J. Lioi of the Newman Community.

Discussing the UCF programs to date, Mr. Clarkson described the first session as a dialogue on Christian togetherness. Assisting him was Jim Kelsey, a sophomore majoring in philosophy and chairman of the UCF Worship Committee, who hopes to become an Episcopal priest. Mr. Clarkson and Mr. Kelsey cited the moves toward union among Protestant churches and the increasing ecumenism with Catholics as two areas of Christian togetherness. The chaplain pointed out that the Ithaca College campus reflects these movements: the Protestant work is cooperative, not denominational, and periodically the UCF joins the Catholics for retreats and services.

The second recording session of the UCF featured contemporary and traditional readings

and music to create a reflective mood. The latest UCF program was a discussion of Bishop John Robinson's *Honest to God*. This discussion was a dialogue between Jim Kelsey and Bruce Smith, a junior majoring in history who is the UCF programming chairman for Probe and who also is planning on becoming an Episcopal priest. The question in point was how to form some new concept of God today. Both Mr. Kelsey and Mr. Smith concurred that the "ground of being" concept was more meaningful for today's world than the more traditional "man in the sky" approach.

B'nai B'rith Hillel in its first program, focused on Jewish persecution and suffering. A tape of Mr. Ellie Wiesel speaking on the Holocaust in Nazi Germany, current persecution of Soviet Jewry, and the state of Israel was played. According to Mr. Robert Loewy, assistant rabbi at Ithaca College, the lesson to be learned from Mr. Wiesel's insights is that the present generation carries burdens of the past but can do something about the future.

For the subsequent Hillel program, Rabbi Goldfarb spoke for a few minutes on worship and its changing forms and then, to exemplify, played a rock service in which the traditional words remained intact but the melodies were changed.

The Newman Community's programs have been aimed primarily at the non church-goer. Father Lioi intends to keep the programs light. Most religious programming tends to be overly heavy and on a Sunday morning on campus students aren't looking for a heavy program, he said.

The theme of the Newman programs has been "celebration." The humorous scripts were written by Father Lioi, who said that a couple of humorous comments are worth a whole hour of lecturing. The scripts have been dialogues between Father Lioi and one other, interrupted periodically with music from Bach or Chuck Mangione. F'ping to dispel the somber frat'f mind, Father Lioi has noted in these programs the joy of primitive religion and the humor present in the Bible.

## Social Agency Gets First Black Director

Walter L. Smart has been appointed executive director of the National Federation of Settlements and Neighborhood Centers. Smart is the first black chief operating executive in the history of the federation or any national social service organization devoted to helping inner city residents of all colors and creeds. The federation provides social, health, and cultural services.

The Genesee Settlement House, at 10 Dake St., Rochester, is a member of the federation. James P. Madry, the executive director, reports that the Settlement House is devoted to an active program of achieving positive change in the Rochester Community.

As executive director, Smart becomes the national coordinator and spokesman for the settlement house movement. Smart believes that settlements and neighborhood centers must not restrict themselves to providing social services, but also be effective instruments in achieving change. Part of the energies, he states, must be directed to the causes of poverty and other dehumanizing aspects in society.
