# REACH Begins Housing Project

Wayland — Recruitment has begun in the Wayland area for a self-help housing project being promoted by Project REACH in Perkinsville under the direction of Francis Chin, housing director.

Chin explained that self-help housing has progressed steadily in Steuben County with one group, the Willing Workers Association, nearing completion of homes. Another group, the Bath Area Self-Helpers, plans to start construction this spring.

Recruitment for a third group here is being based on requests for housing aid being received at REACH headquarters, Perkinsville.

Chin said the program allows families to work together and supply the labor for building their own flomes. They are directed by an experienced construction supervisor who organized training and construction sessions.

Each family obtains its own long-term, low interest loan from the Farmers Home Administration (FHA) to pay the cost of land and materials. No down payment is necessary.

While waiting for loan applications to be approved, the Bath group has met with speakers who have discussed all phases of home ownership including house plans, interior decoration, heating methods, insurance, taxes, building materials and

the process of working together. Chin and group workers Jan Hesbon, Peter Carruth, Dan Soles and Susie DeGrace of the housing staff recently attended a self-help housing conference in Toledo, Ohio, arranged by the Rural Housing Alliance (RHA).

In addition to learning new approaches to common problems, they were taught techniques for working with groups of families, with the FHA office and were assisted in solving complications of construction. An RHA consultant, Frank Martinez, also visited the REACH staff to give on-site advice. Soles, a member of the Bath project, will be organizer and group worker in Wayland.

Information about the program is available at Project REACH, Chin said Judges were William Smith of the Hornell High School faculty, Mrs. William Boyle, Middle

School; Robert Dugan, St. Mary's School, Corning; Daniel Krygier, St. Vincent's, Coffing; Joseph Aini, St. James Mercy Hospital staff; Mrs. James Dagon, home counselor for the Hornell Schools and Sister Mary Carmelia and Sister Mary Nathaniel of Notre Dame High School in Elmira.

Wild life, weather, evolution, the heart, eyes, ears and lungs, forest conservation and the 1935 flood in Hornell were typical exhibits. Youngsters were on hand to answer questions put to them by the judges.

Second and third place winners were:

Eighth grade — Joseph Di-Dio and Michael Rahmlow, second place for their project on sound; Corinne Munn for her papier mache model of a local biome — the Canisteo River valley. A biome is a unit of the environment including earth forms, plant and animal life and factors affecting it.

Seventh grade — James DiDio, second place for a homemade incubator and brooder; Lisa Lackey, third place for her work on volcanoes.

Each contestant was presented with a Science Fair Award from Sister Mary Ambrose, principal of St. Ann's School.
