

## Father Philip Berrigan Convicted on One Count

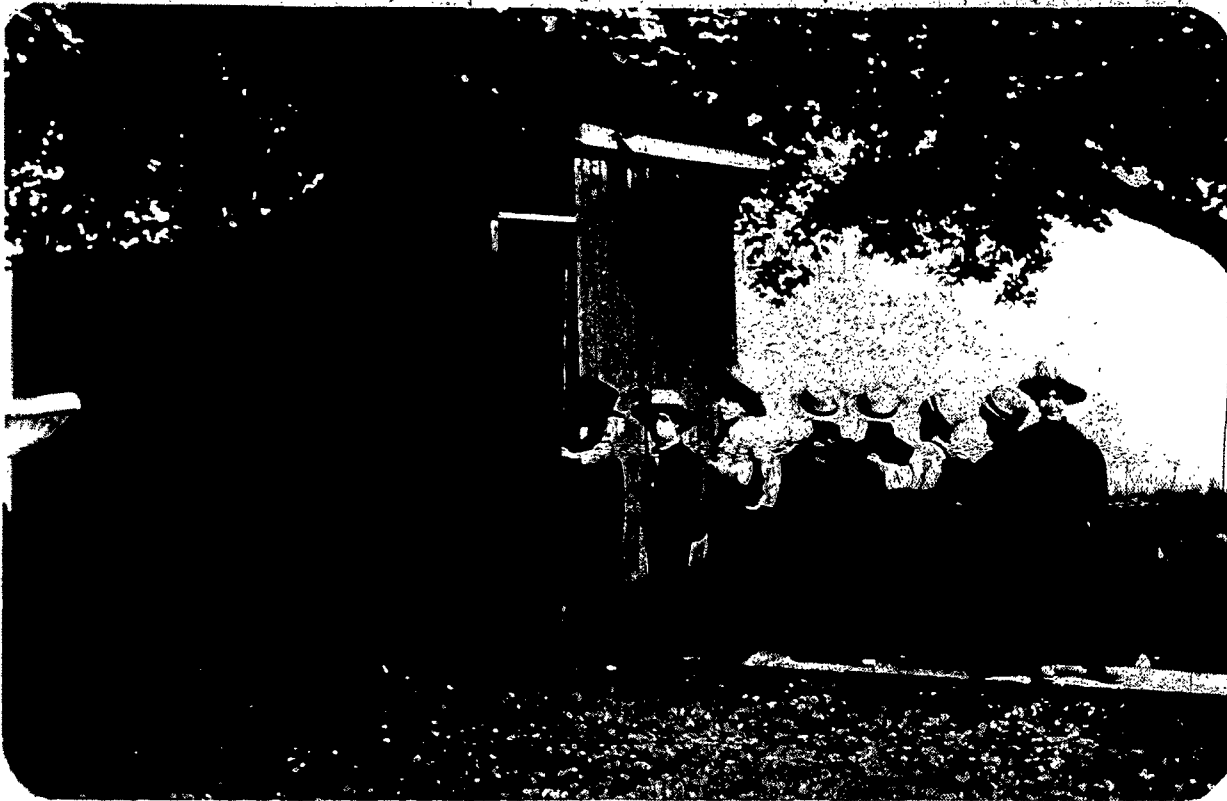
Harrisburg—Father Philip Berrigan was convicted Sunday of smuggling a letter out of prison. As of Courier-Journal press-time, the jury trying him and others of the Harrisburg 7 reported a deadlock on the other counts, including the conspiracy charge.

They reported the deadlock to U.S. District Court Judge R. Dixon Herman who ordered them to make another try. If the deadlock continues, he said, he

would have to dismiss them as a hung jury, making a new trial possible.

The deadlock existed on nine of the ten counts, including one that charges the defendants with plotting to kidnap Henry Kissinger, White House adviser, and to destroy government property.

As a result of the smuggling conviction, Father Berrigan faces a six-year term for destroying draft records.

## Priest Ignores 'War' Tax

St. Paul, Minn. — (RNS) — A Roman Catholic priest is refusing to pay the "war share" of his federal income tax and has asked fellow priests to consider joining him in his protest.

Father Thomas McKenna, 27, assistant pastor at St. Luke's Church here, said he knows of a dozen other priests who are seriously considering withholding the payment of two thirds of their income tax when they file their tax forms. He says that proportion goes for military spending.

Father McKenna sent a letter to more than 100 priests of the archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis inviting them to a meeting to discuss possible tax resistance to the war.

Father McKenna, ordained a priest 10 months ago, said the question of paying taxes for the war arose for him because he is preparing a tax return for the first time.

The letter to the priests noted that many of them have preached homilies against the war, signed statements and marched in demonstrations.

"And yet like us, you are probably wondering if there is something more that can be done," the letter said.

"One possibility that we have discussed is tax resistance. No matter how we vote, no matter what we say, no matter how many statements, marches and demonstrations we endorse, we still support the war (and the weekly death toll) with a large portion of every dollar we pay in federal income and telephone excise taxes."
