ORGANIZED HOME CARE
"WE BELIEVE WE HAVE BARELY SCRATCHED THE SURFACE"
Less than one percent of all hospital patients, exclusive of maternity and newborns, are referred to the Home Care program. It is generally believed that this figure could be increased to five percent with several hundred more patients now in Rochester area hospitals cared for at home for one-sixth the cost of hospital care. Through early hospital discharge, patients with cancer, strokes, orthopedic problems or those recovering from heart attacks or surgery who require short term, intensive coordinated care at home may be spared the institutional grief of illness, thereby releasing many more acute hospital beds.
The Genesee Region Health Planning Council states that a recent study of hospital, nursing home and health related facility beds in the-area concluded that there is a need for expanding Home Care programs.
The Council is urging an increase in use of Home Care in the next five years. The Council feels if there were more of these "less expensive care programs" the more expensive facilities wouldn't have to be built.
