They would simply have said to the people of their day — Jews and pagans — "Now don't get excited — you don't have to believe if you don't want to." Instead, they preached with conviction and laid down their lives in testimony of their faith.

2. With regard to non-Catholics, the Church has always taught that even pagans can be saved by virtue of a baptism of desire if they try to live good lives. As regards - Protestants, we distinguish between material heresy and formal heresy. In the first case, a material heretic is a person in good faith; in the second instance, the formal heretic is a person who leaves the Church, or refuses to embrace the faith because of personal motivation rather than from sincere conviction. Rosary films for May! What better time for viewing Family Rosary films, the creation of Father Peyton himself, than during the month of Our Lady?



Over the past two years a number of articles have appeared in newspapers concerning no fault insurance. I note in particular that of Mr. McGee (Courier-Journal 4-5-72).

Unfortunately because of the vast number of proposals and amendments to proposals pendcult to discuss no fault insurance except under general terms.

The term "no fault insurance" has a rather appealing ring. Everyone obviously would like to collect insurance money regardless of whether he is right or wrong in a situation and simultaneously to enjoy a premium reduction. What does not appear very often in print is the fact that in exchange for this miracle the residents of New York State will surrender, except under certain extraordinary situation, their present right to obtain recovery for personal injury caused to them by the negligence of another.

If the people under our democratic form of government wish to affect this fundamental change in their present insurance protection and coverage, then, of course, it is their right and privilege.

However, there is absolutely no magic saving in no fault insurance. If the insurance protection you now receive is eliminated or substantially reduced, it follows then that your premium cost should be correspondingly reduced because you're getting less coverage for your

But will there actually be a saving? Let us take auto collision insurance. Under the present insurance system, many drivers elect not to carry collision insurance on their cars, relying on their own driving ability to avoid causing an accident and further relying on the fact that if someone wrongfully

damages his car, the guilty party will pay for it. Not so under present proposals. You must carry collision insurance on your own car even though it is damaged by someone else. Thus anyone not carrying collision insurance under the present proposals would be rather soolish. How many of your readlers have recently priced the cost of auto collision insurance?

Second, one proposal calls for paying a maximum of \$2,000 of your net economic loss resulting from an automobile accident. What do you do about additional coverage? The obvious thing is you must carry, at your own expense, additional insurance. How many of your self-employed readers have recently priced the cost of income interruption insurance?

It is quite true that improvements are needed in the present system. I would suggest that one way to avoid delay and court congestion might well be that in negligence cases, as in contract cases, interest be paid by insurance carriers from the date of injury rather than from the date a judgment is entered. I am sure this will cure present procrastination.
