

# Budget Meeting Called by Priests

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clergy. And it is ridiculous for us to talk of priorities again when we have come to grips with them before."

Father Cocuzzi explained that the bishop wanted them to review the matter, but did not mean to direct their vote. He tried to encourage them to consider the basic question, "do we accept Father Moynihan's financial assessment."

The underlying implication, as the council saw it, was that the power and the responsibility of the council was being questioned.

Father Brennan said, "I don't think we can let the implication stand that we do not represent the clergy of Rochester. If that is the case we should dissolve ourselves."

A vote reaffirmed all previously established priorities and it was decided to hold an open

meeting within the next two weeks at which council members can defend priorities to other priests and hear what they feel about them.

After a morning spent on money and schools, the priests returned from lunch to consider the agenda committee's recommendation that they accept the education finance committee's call for an increase in the diocesan assessment in Monroe County to keep education the top priority of the Church's service to Rochester's inner city.

The chancellor said that he didn't think the diocese could budget any more than the \$220,000 the inner city received last year.

Earlier in the day, Father Moynihan had said the school system could survive but not in its present form. "We must reduce our commitments."

Father Raymond Booth, pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, came to the meeting with members of the Black Lay Caucus, Council of Inner City Parishes and others to present a case for school funding and a black apostolate. He said adequate education required such things as non-grading, and two classes of a grade level.

Father Benedict A. Ehmann, pastor of St. Michaels, reported that their school has a full program, and the big problem is teachers' salaries. "We borrow money every two weeks to pay the teachers' salaries," he said.

A vote was taken and the 1.2% increase was approved. How to carry it out will also be discussed at the emergency meeting.

The last item of the day was the recommendation that the Priests' Council urge Bishop Hogan to entrust an established inner city parish with special staff, including a black priest,

to meet the needs of the black community.

Father Booth explained that they were asking council to accept the concept, and then Bishop Hogan with the CACP could work out the details. The recommendation was passed.

## Pentecost Target Date

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There has been a great deal of activity already. St. James Parish, for example, has established a committee for regionalization. Father Thomas Reddington, regional coordinator for Monroe County Northwest, and Father Elmer McDonald, coordinator for the Southwest, have organized steering committees for their Regional Councils.

During the first week of June, the 10 regional coordinators will have an intensive training session at which, Msgr. Mulcahy said, they will consider modern theological approaches and the techniques of managing and integrating their committees.

## Sister Helen Daniel Resigns from Nazareth

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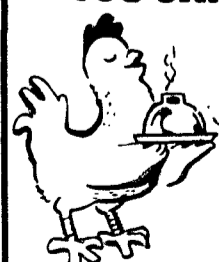


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
