11 to Become Priests, Including Two Diocesans

Eleven men will be elevated to the priesthood in ceremonies throughout the diocese during the month of May.

Of the group, two will be ordained for the Diocese of Rochester — Deacon John Zimmerman and Deacon Robert Rice.

There also will be two ordinations for the Congregation of St. Basil, six for the Society of Jesus, and one for the Columban Fathers.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan will be the ordaining prelate at the May 13 ordination of Deacon Rice at St. Joseph's Church, Wayland. Deacon Rice is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Rice of Rochester. A graduate of St. Bernard's Seminary, Deacon Rice spent his deacon internship working at the Wayland parish.

Also to be ordained for the diocese is Deacon Zimmerman. Bishop Hogan will elevate the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Zimmerman of Spencerport to the priesthood at St. Christopher's Church May 19. A graduate of St. Bernard's, Deacon Zimmerman spent his deacon internship at St. Christopher's Church.

On May 20, James Hastings, a member of the Columbans, will be ordained in St. Francis de Sales Church in Geneva by Bishop Hogan. Hastings is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hastings of Geneva.

St. John the Evangelist Church in Greece will be the site of the Jesuits' ordination, Bishop Hogan presiding. Three McQuaid graduates are among the ordinands — James Connolly, John

Podsiadlo and Michael Siconolfi. The other three names will be announced by the order's headquarters in New York City.

The Basilian priests-to-be are Ronald T. Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Anderson of Rochester, and John F. Robbins, son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Robbins of Rochester. They will be ordained by Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey at Holy Name Church in Greece. Both are graduates of St. Basil's Seminary in Toronto.

Five priests were ordained for the diocese during March and April. In a departure from what used to be traditional practice, new priests are now ordained separately rather than in one large group.
